

*The Strawberry Thief by Joanne Harris

The Strawberry Thief is the latest in the series of four novels about Vianne Rocher, who in the first novel moved into a small French village with her then young daughter, Anouk, to set up a chocolate shop. In this book, set around 16 years later than the first. Vianne has returned to live in the French village of Lansquenet-sous-Tannes after having lived in Paris for a number of years. The first novel, Chocolat, focussed on the conflict between the church and the individual. The Strawberry Thief focuses on the conflicts within families and sensitively considers the bond between mother and child and the difficulties in letting go. Vianne has returned to the village with her mute 16-year-old daughter, Rosette. Rosette is left a piece of land by Narcisse, an unhappy man tormented by a tragic family history. We learn Narcisse's story, which is inter-twined with that of his contemporary, the local priest, who, in turn is tormented by his own past. The novel is full of mystery and mysticism, and while the story-line is quite complex, with references to



characters and events from the earlier novels in the series, those who had not read the earlier books felt that they could none-the-less enjoy this story.

Four members of the book club subsequently went to hear Joanne Harris speak at the Marlborough Literature Festival. It was very interesting to hear about her motivations in writing this series of books, and to learn that this may not be the last we read about Vianne Rocher and her life!

'Wake' by Anna Hope



EATING OUT - THE OLD FIRE STATION, WARMINSTER

What a breath of fresh air! The Old Fire Station - located just behind the Athenaeum Theatre in Warminster - is truly a little gem! Based within the ground floor of an Old Fire Station, it is ideally positioned for 'pre theatre supper' - but it's generally great for going out with family and friends if you are looking for a place with a difference and a cool, relaxed atmosphere. The Old Fire Station is mainly a Pizza Restaurant, but you can also order meat dishes - many with Spanish influences - for instance selections of different 'sharing boards' like Spanish Meat Platter or a Sausage Board or even tapas dishes, and if you pre-order you can even have Spatchcock Chicken or Tomahawk Steak. There is a lot of fire service history and paraphernalia in the building, including old ladders, helmets and firemen's hoses! The place has a very 'trendy' feel about it, the chairs are functional and modern rather than soft and comfy, but the firm seats are soon forgotten over the tasty, freshly prepared pizzas (lovely vegetarian options available), cooked in a brilliant wood fired oven. There is a nice selection of local beers and quality wines available as well as a very large collection of whisky! (That might be because the proprietor is Scottish!) All the staff are very friendly and really keen to please. The decor is simple to quirky but very effective and the colors were chosen wisely to fit an 'Old Fire Station'. The original big doors that once upon a time allowed fire engines to exit and enter the building are an integral part of the restaurant and complete the 'fire station' experience perfectly.

Right now, it already feels Christmassy with pretty little lights draped over the interior and I can imagine that absolutely great Christmas parties can be had in this unique place. Background music varies throughout the night and certainly puts you in a happy, chilled mood.

This place is so unique, you would usually only find something like this in bigger cities - I will definitely return with my family and friends - next time to sample the meat dishes. Be aware, pizzas do not come cheap here, but the quality of food and overall experience is worth it! Price range: £12 - £40 (specially prepared dishes).

Opening hours are 6pm to 10pm Wednesday to Saturday and 11am to 3pm on a Sunday.

These are the standard opening hours, however, for private functions and parties guests are encouraged to call for special arrangements. If you are attending a show at the Athenaeum and require an earlier booking you can contact the restaurant beforehand and they will try to accommodate you earlier if at all possible.

NEWS FROM ROWDE PRIMARY ACADEMY

Our bright start leads to their bright future

I would like to take this opportunity to update everyone in the community about recent changes happening at Rowde Primary School. As many will know, there has been a school here since 1841, serving not only Rowde but surrounding villages too.

At present, the school finds itself in some difficulty. An Inspection at the start of 2019 placed it in Special Measures, and a follow-up visit in September showed that the school was not yet doing enough to address its challenges. This led to Acorn Education Trust taking over the school on November 1st and the introduction of a school improvement team of experienced professionals, each given a specific responsibility in turning round the fortunes of the school, and making it one that the community can be proud of once more.

My role is the day-to-day leadership of this process, and I as I write, I am half-way in to my second week here. Much of this time has been spent meeting pupils and parents, and identifying the work needed to bring the school back to its best. There is a great deal to do, including improving outcomes for pupils, the quality of teaching and assessment, behaviour and

rewards, internal systems, communication with parents, provision for special educational needs and also the progress of our more able students. Crucially, we are working hard to make sure that the steps taken make a rapid difference, and that improvements are secure and long-lasting. Between now and the end of the academic year in July, we will ensure that we are a vastly-improved school.

I will be hosting an evening to meet parents and interested members of the community just before the Christmas break, where I will announce the first phase of changes. It would be wonderful to see you there, and details of times and dates will be published very soon. For now, if you would like to meet me or be part of the transformation, or even just share your views on the work ahead, please get in touch. I would be delighted to hear from you.

All it takes is a beautiful fake smile to hide an injured soul.







Fundraising – Donations have been received of £300.00 towards the purchase of a raiser chair for use in the village. The Parish Council will match this amount.

Planning

Rowde joins Devizes Neighbourhood Planning

- Rowde Parish has agreed to join the Devizes Area Neighbourhood Plan.
- There will be consultations for residents about what the priorities are for the village.

Tower View – outline development proposal

An outline proposal has been submitted to the

Parish Council to build on a plot of land adjacent to 41 Tower View. This land is owned by Aster and it is considered to be suitable for infill development. The initial sketch plan shows scope to develop a three bedroom detached house with 2 off road parking spaces.

Malthouse Farm

Planning applications

- Two further applications have been submitted for Malthouse Farm. One is to vary the conditions of the original application (17/08775/FUL): condition 3, 4, 5 and 19 of application (19/10318/VAR) and
- To discuss reserved matters (19/10497/REM) dealing with appearance, landscaping, layout and scale following approval of hybrid planning application 17/08775/FUL. These applications will be considered at the Parish Council meeting in December.

Access to development

- It has been suggested that construction vehicles for Malthouse Farm should not access the site via Cock Road. Wiltshire Council has confirmed that the principle access into the site is off Cock Road and this will be the access point for five of the six dwellings. The Clerk has tried to contact the developer to discuss access to the site from alternative routes. There has been no response yet.
- Wiltshire Council has confirmed that it will not be possible to erect a sign stating "no construction traffic". Any sign erected on highways land may be subject to enforcement action and removed by an officer. The sign would not carry any weight and could not be enforced by the Council or local highway authority.

Footpaths

- Wiltshire Council has made an order to divert footpath ROWD13, on the Common.
- The hedgerow along the permissive footpath, off Devizes Road, needs attention. Wiltshire Council are dealing with any issues that arise.

Highways

Pavements

- The Community Area Transport Group (CATG) has agreed to fund 10 dropped kerbs and to widen 4 kerbs around the village. The Parish Council will pay 25% of the costs (£2, 275). It is anticipated that the work will take place in January, allowing for the winter team to be taken off to do other jobs at short notice.
- The Community Area Transport Group (CATG) has also agreed to create a design for the proposed footpath in Tanis. The Parish Council will contribute 25% to the cost of the plan.

Tractor transport

 Complaints have been received from residents about crops spilling onto the roads and pavements in the village from unsheeted tractors. If there is a risk of hay or straw blowing onto the road the driver should consider sheeting the load.

- It was noted that it is the driver's responsibility to ensure that his load is safe before he travels. It is a government recommendation to sheet loads of crops for transport.
- Wiltshire Council is aware of problems with tractor transportation around the County. The Police is the main enforcement body for road traffic offences. It is recommended that residents record the tractor registration number if they are concerned about the safety of a load and report it to the Police.

The Common

The Parish Council will host a meeting in January with residents from the Common to discuss the ongoing maintenance of the area.

The Playing Fields & Allotments

- Residents are asked not to use unauthorised vehicles on the playing field, for example tractors, quad bikes or motorbikes.
- The Parish Council's grounds contractor has carried out work to clear the area adjacent to the allotment car park to prevent further fly-tipping. Repairs have also been carried out to the Sands Lane track.
- Wiltshire Council has agreed to work to side out the pavements around the village and along the A342. This will be carried out by the Parish Council's grounds maintenance contractor.
- Quotes are being sought to carry out minor repairs highlighted in the recent safety reports.

Police Update

Rowde incidents

- Overnight on 26.10.19-27.10.19, Unknown suspect/s have entered a farm yard and forced open a combination lock securing a white diesel tank. Suspect/s have then taken an estimated 300 litres of fuel from the tank.
- The Police have received reports of Cold Callers this month in Rowde. Please remain vigilant, and do not answer the door unless you are expecting somebody. If somebody tries to sell something to you on the doorstep, just close the door and call the Police, as a lot of these people are not licensed to sell door-to-door.

PUBLIC HEALTH

We would like to thank everyone for their support following the shop closure.

For several years now we have been saying we needed more volunteers

and more importantly increased trade to make it viable. Neither have been forthcoming.

So as stated in previous mag articles it was a case of use us or lose us. The small band that kept it running must be thanked for their dedication in working hard to keep it going for the last ten years.

There is also another band of villagers, that although not seen behind the counter, were there to do building work, repairs, electrical work, deliveries and banking. And this includes Janet at accounts. This team gave their time for free, as well as parts etc, and all this has been lost because the village chose not to listen. Another important community group wiped out by village apathy.

We have had comments regards devaluation of their houses, now there is no shop.

Also missing will be popping in to pick up courier parcels left at the shop, as well as using the toilet facility, or expecting it to do pay point which we had to pay a fee for every transaction done which made it too expensive to implement, hence why all shops in Devizes stopped doing it. Providing tobacco at as low a cost possible, or a newspaper, without any other purchase did not give the village a shop.

It is worth pointing out Lidle and Aldi do not sell tobacco, because there is no money in it.

When the shop idea was born, it was easy to say yes, sign a share to prove the village wanted it then think there was not a need to actually use it for it to survive. It is an easy option to say we did not stock what was wanted, we stocked a wide range of goods and some specific items asked for, only to find the customer did not bother to purchase them.

We have had some good times with our regular customers and the laughter and camaraderie will be sadly missed.

We wish you well and hope that, as you pass an empty building that was once a happy place to visit, you will remember us all. Festive greetings to you all.

PUBLIC NOTICE Rowde Community Shop Ass. Ltd Dissolution

The Association may be dissolved by the consent of three quarters of the members by their signatures to an instrument of dissolution, or by winding up in a manner provided by the acts. If on the winding up or dissolution of the association any of its assets remain to be disposed of after its liabilities are satisfied, the assets shall not be distributed among its members, but shall be transferred to such organisation or organisations having objects similar or compatible with those of the Association as may be decided by the members at or before the time of the winding up or dissolution or, in so far as the assets are not so transferred then to some charitable object.

Shares

Shares of the value of £10 each shall be issued to persons and corporate bodies upon admission to membership of the Association. 

Message from the Rectory

Dear Friends,

The temperature outside is falling as I write, and it feels as though autumn is over and winter is standing by to take over. Our Christmas is set at the darkest time of year, just as the winter solstice is past and we can start to look forward to the return of light and warmth. It's no co-incidence that we celebrate the birthday of Jesus at the same time as the ancient festival of Saturnalia, when Romans marked the solstice.

There is no accurate record of the day of the year when Jesus was born. Over the years, many dates have been claimed by different writers, and in the early years after his life on earth, some of these included April 18th, May 20th and November 2nd! But some people didn't like the idea of celebrating his birthday, as it seemed too similar to the way that kings in the Middle East were honoured. Some Christians today, such as the Religious Society of Friends (Quakers), choose not to mark Christmas Day at all because they want to think about the birth of Jesus every day of the year.

Christmas has been observed on December 25th in western Europe since about 312 AD. The Emperor Constantine who converted to the Christian faith decided that Christians and non-Christians should be united in commemorating the Venerable Day of the Sun, a Roman festival. Christians wanted to celebrate the one true God, and adopting a pagan event seemed a good way to show how important Jesus was to them. One of the early titles for Jesus was the "Sun of Righteousness".

At Rowde Church, we will be celebrating the birth of Jesus Christ with carol singing, a crib service, a Christingle service and Communion services on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day. Do come and join us, to remember what God has done for us in coming to earth to share our joys and sorrows. However you are spending the holidays, we wish you joy, peace, and every blessing.



Time for Carers Appeal 2019/20

Carer Support Wiltshire, the charity that supports the unpaid carers in our communities, is currently running an appeal to raise £30,000 to spend on carers.

They are looking for local groups and individuals who would like to help fundraise for the Time for Carers Appeal. That could be by holding an event like a raffle or auction, asking for donations at a quiz or bingo night or taking part in a sponsored run or swim. Anything you'd like to do, CSW can support you with.

There are an estimated 47,500 carers in Wiltshire. A carer is anyone who cares, unpaid, for a family member or friend who could not always manage without their support. They might look after someone with a physical disability, long term health condition, mental health issue or a problem with substance misuse.

It can be an incredibly rewarding thing to do for someone, but can take its toll as well. 40% of carers say they haven't had a day off in over a year, while 25% haven't had a day off in over five years. The effect of not getting a rest from caring is shattering, with carers describing being close to breaking point, desperate for some time to themselves, to sleep, recuperate and see friends and family.

Regular breaks have been proven to combat burnout and stress and money raised by the appeal will directly pay for breaks for carers. Last year's appeal helped over 80 carers take the time they needed to improve their health and wellbeing. It paid for respite care, theatre tickets, yoga classes, counselling sessions and much more.

Claire, a carer who looks after her mother who has dementia, said: "It wasn't even about being given the money to go away – it was about being seen and valued as a carer and given the recognition and support that enabled me to carry on."

Helping Unpaid Carers in Wiltshire Return to the Work

Carer Support Wiltshire has launched a new programme that will help unpaid carers in Wiltshire who want to return to work.

Many people give up work when a loved one becomes ill in order to care for them. It can be challenging to return to work once they are ready to go back – carers often feel their skills have become out of date and they lack confidence.

Funding was awarded to the Wiltshire charity by the government and the Returners Fund website is now live at carersbacktowork.co.uk. Carers can register on the site and will then be able to access support and various tools and resources. There are also small group training sessions and mentoring available.

CSW will also work in partnership with local employers, who will provide mentoring, advice and on-site training. In return they will have access to skilled potential new employees and CSW can help employers to support the carers in their workforces. Scores of extra books are now on the shelves at Rowde Primary Academy which is embarking on a new chapter in its life.

Rowde Academy is undergoing many changes after Ofsted inspectors highlighted a number of issues that need improving including reading.

But head Sue Hulford is confident her school can get out of special measures and is delighted with the gift of £4,000 worth of books from Rowde Academy Friends and Teachers.

Teacher Kate Dummett, who is the school's reading lead, said: "Having new and current high quality children's books is very important as reading and building a love of reading has a strong impact on all areas of their learning. Reading for pleasure increases empathy, better relationships with others and improved well-being. It also impacts of children's attainment now and in the future. Plus it's great fun."

Money was raised by holding events including discos, a film night, selling Christmas cards and refreshments at school tournaments.

Head Sue Hulford believes her school has a bright future as it prepares to become part of an academy trust, despite Ofsted inspectors deciding the school must stay in special measures. Their report, following a monitoring visit after the rating was given in March, said: "Leaders and managers are not taking effective action for the removal of special measures."

Mrs Hulford believes the decision to join the Acorn Education Trust will be the start of a new chapter for the school. Rowde was due to join the trust, which includes two senior schools and a number of village primaries, on November 1.

She said: "We believe we have already made a number of changes since the main Ofsted inspection in March. My top priority was to make sure that safeguarding was brought up to scratch and the monitoring inspection found that safeguarding is now effective."

Experienced teacher Hannah Elson has joined the school as deputy head and Max Burr from the Acorn Trust is now its executive head.

She said: "Being part of the trust gives me so much more support. We have started along the right path. Joining the trust is going to be a new start."

Reading was highlighted by inspectors for a cause for concern and Mrs Hulford said changes were already being put in place to make sure children received more supervision and are challenged more.

A number of governors left the school last term, but new chairman Kate Hunloke is also confident the school will have improved when inspectors return again in a few months time.

She said: "I have been a governor here for a long time but taking the chairmanship is a big responsibility. I believe in Sue and all the staff. The report was disappointing but it was not all negative, especially when you put it in context."

She said that parents had been mainly supportive and staff were enthusiastic.

ROWDE RIFLE CLUB ARE WINNERS!





Back in August, Rowde Rifle Club were victors once again in the Carnival Cup. A lovely bit of Devizes tradition, the Carnival Cup is a shooting competition started by Harry Bates, manager of the Dolphin Public House many years ago. The competition is still held but is now run by Bernard Ashton at The Conservative Club.

The Carnival Cup final is always held during the Devizes Carnival Week and is for teams of six shooters. The teams can be made up of anyone wishing to take part. Using a .22 rifle and live ammunition, team members take it in turn to shoot at a 'bell target' (a small hole in a steel plate with a bell behind it). If the bell rings the shot is counted as a hit. What makes this particular competition even more interesting is that everyone must use the same rifle, an ancient thing that there is always talk of it being worn out, doesn't shoot straight and so on. There might well be some truth in that but certainly the reality is that it is unfamiliar to the shooters so levels the playing field somewhat.

This year Rowde beat Potterne in the final, repeating our success of 2017 and 2018. The final started quite tensely, with the scores being neck and neck for the first few shooters. Then one good score from a Rowde shooter put us several shots ahead, unsettling the

opposition maybe, then another good Rowde score made it difficult for Potterne to keep up. A team can never sit back and relax because the competition can change quickly but Rowde kept the lead and won.

Members of Rowde Rifle Club have won other trophies this year – Chris Godwin won the highest individual score in the Carnival Cup competition and some of the league cups came our way too, with Laurence Plumb becoming Tube* Individual champion, Bob Luke and Eddie Bowden were runners up in the Holloway Cup and Mayenne Cup respectively.

*Tube is the term given to the type of range, where the target is at the far end of a steel tube that you shoot down. Rowde's range is a tube.

The Devizes Miniature Rifle League shoot at different venues in the Devizes area, including several pubs and an "open" range where the shooters lie prone, holding inter-club and individual competitions. It is peculiar to Devizes and nearby villages; well it's about right at that only in Devizes would you find folk with a pint in one hand a rifle in the other. Originally set up over a hundred years ago country-wide to improve marksmanship (trouble was on the way by way of war), this is now the only part of the country in which the sport continues. 

SHORT STORY

FORGET ME NOT

A tribute by Sylvie, aged sixteen

I'd never had a granddad but that was to change when I was six. My grandmother, widowed before I was born, surprised us all with the sudden announcement that she was getting married. I found it hard to imagine her as a bride in a wedding dress and even more difficult to imagine a whole new grandparent by her side. Having had no experience of a granddad, I had only a very stereotypical idea of what one would be like - a kind, slightly tubby old man with grey hair, puffing on a pipe and wearing brown slippers - after all, this was the granddad figure that was depicted in my story books.

The first meeting was arranged and I realise now that he was probably rather nervous about meeting us whereas I was just interested in a promised trip to the local park which almost always had an ice cream van. When the doorbell rang I was taken aback to see a tall handsome man standing there. He had white hair that was neatly combed into place and a gentle face with twinkly blue eyes that promised mischief. He wasn't wearing the brown jumper with elbow patches that I'd expected but was dressed in a button-down blue shirt and smart trousers much like my dad might wear to work.

This new granddad did not behave like a granddad either. To my amazement, once at the park, he launched himself down the slide and was first in line for an ice cream.

As I grew, so too did our affection for one another. Rather than taking on the traditional role as grandparent he became instead my friend. Before retirement he had been an accountant. You would have thought that being responsible for other people's money meant you had to be serious but he had never grown up; he was a big kid. In the hallway of his house was a large hamper and one afternoon I had opened the lid expecting it to be full of uninspiring things like blankets. Instead inside was a huge collection of polar bears! Each toy was different and had been carefully named by him. I remember him taking a childish delight in throwing them head first down the stairs. He reasoned that, "They wanted to go sky diving!" Every so often, for a change, he'd tie one to a long piece of elastic for a spot of bungee jumping over the landing. Whenever I was told that we were going to visit I would run straight to my room and find a good pen because we would always sit down and do word searches together or play on our matching Nintendos. He was no ordinary granddad – he was unique. As I got older our conversations became more and more interesting and he would often talk to me about his past. He told me how he had learned to read at an early age and would sit and read aloud from the newspaper to his parents when he was just four. He was disappointed when he finally started school to be given books with no more than a few simple words on each page. In the house

he shared with Grandma almost every room was crammed with books.

The garage had been converted into a library but even then a separate cabin was built in the garden for the overflow. My Grandma told me that there were over 10,000 books, some of them rare first editions. My sister and I decided he must be very wise and so gave him the name "Grandpa Owl" after the wise old owl in Winnie the Pooh. He lived up to his new nickname and never tired of my questions; he was the perfect person to go to for help with homework. It started with a simple question. One summer afternoon he asked me whether I wanted a cold Sprite. Of course, I said yes but the minutes ticked by and there was still no sign of the promised drink. I went to investigate and peeking into the kitchen I saw him staring at the can puzzled. I asked him whether he was okay. He slowly shook his head and said he couldn't remember how to open it. I was shocked. I didn't understand. I opened it for him, laughing it off, but from that point on I began to notice other things that he forgot – places he'd been, his pin number, the way home...

Later I overheard my mum on the phone talking about a thing called "dementia". This "dementia" was about to tear my grandpa from my reach and keep him lost in his forgetfulness. More and more of his memory was locked away - names, places, the days of the week and even how to get dressed and how to eat. I watched helplessly as he would stand very still willing the right words to come out but often what he said made no sense at all. Gradually the ties that connected us so tightly became loose. Grandpa couldn't remember what a Nintendo was or how you might use it. The books stayed on the shelves collecting dust and I was left to do the word searches on my own. Only the polar bears remained as part of our games though even they had to adjust to a less adventurous lifestyle. I had to learn to treasure the little things such as when I would tickle his toes as I'd gently place his slippers back on the right feet.

My last visit was to the care home. He had gone to live there when caring for him had become too much for my Grandma. Despite its soft furnishings, and the carers in blue uniforms efficiently bringing tea, it didn't feel homely. I remember feeling afraid that he would not know who I was, but though he was very frail, and seemed to have shrunk, he looked up straight away and smiled directly at me. He couldn't recall my name, or remember exactly how we were connected, but in the still handsome blue eyes there was the flicker of recognition. "Hello, Grandpa Owl," I said simply and I sat down on the edge of the bed with his favourite polar bear safely tucked up between us.

Editor's Footnote: Sylvie is a 16 year old student living in Scotland. She wrote a heartfelt essay, titled Forget Me Not, about her granddad's earliest signs of dementia. I have printed Sylvie's essay unedited and exactly as she wrote it.






