BOOK REVIEWS 'The Hound of the Baskervilles' by Arthur Conan Doyle

The Hound of the Baskervilles is a detective novel written in around 1901, a classic in the detective genre.

It follows the story of the Baskerville family's superstition that there is a demonic hound that stalks and murders them.

Agreeing to take the case, Holmes however, announces that he is too busy in London to accompany Mortimer and Sir Henry to Devonshire to get to the bottom of the case and he sends Dr. Watson to be his eyes and ears, insisting that he reports back regularly.

Once in Devonshire, Watson discovers a state of emergency, with armed guards on the watch for an escaped convict roaming the moors. He meets the Baskerville neighbours and potential suspects, Mr & Mrs Barrymore, Mr Jack Stapleton and his sister Beryl.

Watson keeps Holmes informed and Holmes eventually arrives in Devon for the final show down....

We felt as a group that the characterisation of the characters was very good, some felt Watson was a bit of a feminist character and acted toward Holmes as a good wife might. The description of the moors and of Baskerville Hall certainly gave the book a very eerie feel. Some of us enjoyed the old fashioned English language. We also wondered if written today it would have been such a big success. Certainly a book of its time.



'A Man called Ove' by Fredrik Backman

This debut novel written by Swedish author Fredrick Backman (2014) is about a very grumpy but quietly heroic man called Ove. He is a stickler for rules. A man with a rigid routine who loves order. He is labelled as bitter and cranky but his backstory reveals the loss and sadness which have shaped his character.

A heart condition has forced Ove, a 59 year old widower into early retirement. Now a lonely recluse, he lacks purpose and is overwhelmed by grief for his beloved late wife, Ove finds himself contemplating suicide. Ove's string of suicide attempts is thwarted by a series of comically mundane interruptions which inadvertently bring him into contact with neighbours and he would generally avoid.

Despite the inherently melancholic undertone, the book is interspersed with moments of unexpected hilarity combining humour with heartfelt storytelling. The text is by turns both very funny and immensely sad with unexpected twists.



THE HOUND

OF THE BASKERVILLES

The arrival of a lively young family next door sets off a series of events which unravel Ove's tough façade and gradually reveal a more compassionate side. Their interaction with him infuses warmth, humour and unexpected friendship into his life demonstrating the transformative power of human connection. When asked for help by the neighbours, he lends a ladder and fixes their problems albeit muttering under his breath, His skills as a handy man and car mechanic are evident. He takes an interest in affairs and rallies support to help an old rival who has developed dementia. Ove is made to feel valued and useful which changes his outlook on life. An annoying stray cat which adopts him serves as a comic relief and is also symbolic of Ove's transformation from bitter recluse to a well-loved figure in the community.

The book is a memorable read. All Book Club Members with one exception loved it giving it an average score of 8.5/10 (the lone dissenter found some parts to be too predictable and repetitive but did admit that she had read less than half of the book).

This book was adapted into a very successful film in 2022 starring Tom Hanks but the name Ove was changed to Otto for the American market.

In the quayside tavern Old sailers keep vigil by candle light Raise a glass and pray to Neptune For those out on the sea tonight


Like some Banshee From the depths of Hell You could hear the wind's howling wail As it screamed, ripped, Lashed and tore At every mast and sail

The Mind Tree Café – Furlong Close

L Gurr & L Newton from The Mind Tree Café gave a presentation on their plans for the Administration buildings at Furlong Close. They are also leasing the orchard, workshop and polytunnel.

Phase one of the project involves providing a low-cost counselling service in the administration block, either through GP referral or self-referral. They will grow produce in the orchard. The project will be inclusive for everyone, including residents in Furlong Close.

Phase two of the project will rent out some of the studios/ classrooms. Local people can rent space if they want space to work or hold classes. Phase three, it is hoped there will be a community shop and a café. It will be a café with a difference, to help support people socially with a buddy partner available.

There have been problems with getting the building ready for use. A plea was made for volunteers who can donate some time and skills to get the building into a usable space: for example, volunteers who are builders or electricians.

National Grid Project & Conscience Lane – Traffic!

The Parish Council was given a presentation by representatives for the National Grid's North Wessex Downs Visual Impact Provision (VIP) project.

Work has begun on the project to remove 13 pylons across Roundway Down. Archaeologists are currently on site. Work will be completed by Spring 2026. The National Grid representatives informed the meeting that the proposed haul road will not be in place in time for the initial enabling works. This means that construction traffic and employees will have to use Conscience Lane for a period of up to 16 weeks, starting on 2nd April 2024. There will be some large vehicle movements between 9am – 3pm. Local residents are advised to avoid using Conscience Lane during this time as a safety precaution if they are able to.

There is a dedicated phone line and email for residents to report any problems directly to National Grid: visualimpact@nationalgrid.com: 0330 1340051.

Resurfacing of Rowde Court Road: Some residents have complained about the recent resurfacing of Rowde Court Road, asking why that road had been chosen; questioning the materials used and the workmanship. Wittshire Council Highways has responded to say that 'Micro-Asphalt is a cost-effective surface treatment best used on roads showing early stages of wear and tear and can extend the life of a carriageway by up to 10 years.... The bedding-in process takes around one to three months'.

Planning

Planning Applications

NEW! PL/2024/02280 Car Park site (Cross Keys car park) and adjoining footpath High Street: Full planning application for altered access, stopping up of footway and construction of 2no. use Class C3 dwellings with associated car parking.

The Parish Council had not been able to fully consider the application before the March Parish Council meeting. The Clerk has made a request for an extension on time to consider the application. If this is not granted, the Parish Council agreed to object to the application on grounds of visibility from the loss of the visibility splay at the end of Marsh Lane.

PL/2024/01968 The Firs, The Locks, Devizes, SN10 1QR Demolition of existing dwelling and construction of replacement dwelling complete with associated external works. The Parish Council had no objections to the application due to it being on a similar footprint to the existing property, and it is mostly out of sight.

PL/2023/07208 - Land adjacent 35 Tower View, Rowde, Devizes, SN10 2PS

Proposal: Outline application with all matters reserved for erection of a Dwelling. The Parish Council objected to the outline planning application on grounds of access and parking. This application has since been approved by Wiltshire Council.

PL/2023/10888 - Stroud Farm, Rowde, Wiltshire, SN15 2JL: Consultation – Full planning permission: Change of use of agricultural building to rural worker dwelling. The Parish Council object to the application. A detached house has been built without planning permission. The Parish Council objected to this application.

Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group – update: The Clerk provided an update on a recent meeting with a Senior Planning Policy Officer from Wiltshire Council and some members of the Devizes Neighbourhood Area Steering Group. Rowde Parish needs to allocate land for 47 houses (67 total figure including completed and committed builds).

Sites for Rowde are still being assessed by AECOM, a consultancy firm. When these assessments have been completed, parishioners of Rowde will be consulted and residents will be able to put forward their preferences for development sites. Sites put forward by landowners need to be proceedable, i.e. the landowner is prepared to build on their land.

Haymeadow Way – Wiltshire Council has asked permission from the Parish Council to run a foul drain pipework under the grassed section of the Silverlands Play Area. The proposed area will run along the pavement to the Primary School, then under the middle of the grassed football area. The Parish Council has been asked by Wiltshire Council to grant them an easement for this to be carried out. There will be a 3-metre radius around the pipework, which the Parish Council will not be permitted to disturb once the easement has been agreed.

The Parish Council will request that the trenchwork is not carried out over the school Easter holidays.

Planning application for land off Sands Lane -

PL/2023/00386 Land West of Sands Lane. Wiltshire Council has rejected the application to build up to 50 homes on this site for reasons including the site being outside of the settlement boundary and that the number of new builds would exceed the housing target for the village; the site is in open countryside; there were highways concerns; issues with flooding and archaeological reasons. R Eccles, J Grey, and G Clisby-White for all of their work behind the scenes on this complex case. Cllr Mayes was thanked on behalf of the community for all of her work to achieve this outcome on the application.

Flooding plan

There is a meeting of the North Wiltshire Operational Flood Working Groups taking place on 28th March 2024, 9.30am, at the Melksham Campus in March, which the Parish Council Chairman will attend. The parish will prepare a flood plan for the village. This will include asking for volunteers who are 4x4 drivers, and first aiders.

L Wills met with a representative from Aster at Silverlands Road to discuss the near flooding that happened on 4th January 2024. Aster have agreed to clear the ditch behind the houses in Silverlands Road. L Wills has also spoken to the owner of Furlong Close about the brambles on their side of the boundary, which has caused the Aster fence to be pushed into the culvert in some places. The owner has cut back the brambles on their side.

Highways

Speed Indicator Device (SID): C Greenwood reported that the SID is working properly now with the new batteries installed.

J Grey reported that last month's speed data had been submitted to the Police. The system is automated now and easier to use.

Community Speedwatch: C Greenwood has arranged a training/recruitment session for using the Community Speedwatch camera on Saturday 23rd March 2024 at Rowde Primary School. Everyone is invited to attend.

Allotments

The ground is still very wet, but some plot holders are starting to tend to their plots. The hedge that borders the playing field has been cut and lowered in height.

Allotment holders are reminded to keep the gate closed to avoid damage being caused by it being left open to the wind. Allotment holders are also reminded not to use chemicals on or around their plots.

There will be an amendment to the current allotment tenancy to notify tenants that if they do not tend their plots, their tenancy may be cancelled.

Dog owners - request for owners to act responsibly

The Parish Council has received a complaint about some residents walking their dogs off lead in the built-up part of the village. Dog owners are reminded that dogs must be under their owner's control at all times, and they are asked to be respectful of other people.



GOING UNDERGROUND IN THE NORTH WESSEX DOWNS NATIONAL LANDSCAPE

National Grid's Visual Impact Provision (VIP) is a stakeholder-led programme transforming our most beautiful, protected landscapes.

The aim of VIP is to reduce the impact of our existing overhead transmission network in National Landscapes and National Parks in England and Wales.

There are currently five schemes in total, including the North Wessex Downs VIP. The project will transform the views on Roundway Hill, by removing 4.6km of existing overhead electricity line and 13 pylons, replacing them with cables buried underground. With all the permissions in place, the project has just started construction with the pylons due to come down in 2026.

In Devizes, we've worked closely with the local

parish and town councils, Wiltshire Council, the North Wessex Downs National Landscape team and other interested groups to produce a project which will not only change the landscape but also deliver wider environmental benefits by enhancing biodiversity in the area.

Short-term enabling works – Conscience Lane, Rowde and Roundway

The vast majority of our construction traffic will make use of a temporary haul road which we will build in the middle of our site. However, this will not be ready until summer 2024 and for the project to meet its planned dates, it's vital that enabling works start in April 2024. As a result, we will need to use Conscience Lane temporarily for a period of 12-16 weeks.

Vehicles will only use the lane between 9am and 3pm only and larger vehicles (44 tonnes +) will be escorted to make sure that they progress safely and disruption is minimised as much as possible.

If large vehicles are using the lane, members of our team will temporarily halt the traffic coming from the opposite direction until the vehicle has entered our construction site. This should cause no more than a couple of minutes delay. Access will be from the A342 only – no traffic will come through Roundway – and vehicles will enter our site via a new temporary access just to the east of Rowdefield Farm.

Safety is our top priority and we are making sure that information about safe driving on Conscience Lane is shared through driver briefings and daily tool box talks.

An initial condition survey will make sure that we do not leave any lasting impact on the lane. We will repair any damage we cause and return it to its original condition at the end of our works.

We're also aware of a number of local events but if there is something coming up that you think we should be aware of please let us know using the methods below.

WILTSHIRE COUNCIL STARTS CONSTRUCTION IN 1,000 HOMES PLAN

Work recently began on a Wiltshire Council scheme to build new housing developments at Haymeadow Way in Rowde and Maud Davies Close at Corsley.

This project is part of a wider 10-year plan to build 1,000 affordable homes across the county. There will be 10 new homes in Rowde and eight in Corsley. They will be a mix of social rent and shared ownership properties, and are scheduled to be completed later this year.

Cllr Phil Alford, cabinet member for housing, said the dwellings would be "much needed" and have low running costs. He added: "Work recently



began on two new housing sites as part of our programme to provide 1,000 affordable homes over the next decade. They are part of our council house build programme, which will see around £200m invested in building new, energy-efficient council homes up to 2030. We will also be making substantial investment in improving our current council homes to ensure they achieve a minimum energy performance rating of B."

The council says the new homes will be factorybuilt in Dorset to "the highest quality standard" before being delivered to the site.

The developments will boast a mix of bungalows, flats and houses, with gardens and parking.

CANAL AND RIVER TRUST IN ROW OVER SINKHOLE NIGHTMARE

A local landowner is being plagued by sinkholes and fears his land is at risk of major subsidence.

Mark Merison, the owner of Merison Sporting Ltd, lives on 21 acres of land at The Locks, on the outskirts of Rowde.

But the 66-year-old claims his fields have been hit by significant water damage, causing dozens of sinkholes, which he believes was sparked by a broken Canal and River Trust (CRT) pipe. The CRT denies that the ground movement is due to any pipes belonging to them and points to natural factors as the cause.

During excavations carried out by the trust, after concerns were raised last year, a broken historic clay land drain was discovered. But engineers say this was "no longer interconnected" and was not the cause of the land movement.

Mr Merison said: "There are dozens of sinkholes, and they're made by water damage, I'm desperate because I want to be able to enjoy my home. I could hear subterranean water and the only water

source nearby to my understanding is the Kennet and Avon Canal. I've got great sinkholes appearing all over the place because of this cracked land drain, I think I've got subsidence, and I don't want to end up in Rowde. It feels like a corporate giant riding roughshod over the small people."

The Devizes property was also the subject of flooding three times in 2023 when water from the canal "cascaded" down the hill towards Mr Merison's home.

He has called for the CRT to help repair the damage which is creating the sinkholes. He added: "I'm a believer of live and let live but it appears to me to be damage caused by them, they should be doing something."

But the CRT has carried out a lengthy investigation into the cause of the issue and insists it is not responsible for any damage. They have produced a report into the seepage and ground movement based on surveys of the area and water testing. The report warned that the risk of failure on the slope is likely to increase because of "climate change."

A spokesperson said: "We have carried out an extensive investigation, which included water testing, geology and hydrology surveys. The problem is caused by factors which are not connected to the canal or to the Canal & River Trust; likely causes include underground spring water and land movement in the area. We have provided Mr Merison with the report detailing the findings."

CANAL BOATERS 'LEFT TO FREEZE BY ENERGY SUPPORT EXCLUSION'

Members of the boating community at Rowde have been "left to freeze" over winter after being "excluded" from energy support payments. Many boaters found themselves ineligible for two payments promised to households across the UK which total a £600 discount on energy bills.

Those who do not constantly cruise or have a permanent mooring where Council Tax applies say they're ineligible for numerous government schemes.

Many paying to moor at Caen Hill Marina, near Rowde village, faced a doubling in energy costs but received no support.

Mary, who moors at the marina with her young child, feels boaters have been excluded from help. She said: "I feel like I've begged for it. I have filled out every form possible and still I'm being refused because I don't tick the right box. People living on boats don't fit in the right category and there's no common sense to say you are still a human and you have still got a family." Another boat owner is one of many at the marina now forced to use local foodbanks because of rising costs.

He said: "Lots of people have left the marina because they couldn't afford to pay the rising costs. You can get support from Julian House but it's hard to ask for help. I'm having to use my savings just to live, but savings should be for an emergency, not for food and heating. My savings will eventually disappear."

A campaign group launched a petition, calling for all people living on inland boats to be granted the payments, and is seeking support via alex@ devizesanddistrict.foodbank.org.uk.

Alex Montegriffo, a local community organiser, says boaters have been "left to freeze" over winter. They added: "Some boaters have been driven to the doors of our food bank due to a lack of support. We had double the number of referrals for emergency food parcels from boaters in the last seven months, compared to the last financial year."

The Department for Energy Security and Net Zero uses the CRT's continuous cruisers database to locate recipients of support.

A spokesperson said: "We recognise the costof-living challenges families are facing and spent £40 billion paying around half a typical household's energy bill last winter. Those able to demonstrate they were living on boats as their main or sole residence were offered support worth £600 through the Energy Bills Support Schemes and Alternative Fuel Payment Schemes. People unable to apply for these schemes may be eligible for other forms of support, such as the cost-of-living payments, depending on their circumstances."

Ebbs and Flows – Metaphors for Human Life

Hills are heavy and saturated. Once helpful paths are treacherously slippery. Wood pieces and leaves are carted by the speed of running rivers tugging at them. Even the man-made tarmac surfaces are threatened by repetitive waves of rainwater breaking on them, naturally altering as it ebbs and flows.

There must be some good that can come of the weather's ability to waterlog our every day and flood our brains with weather-talk. How can human life and so much water be compatible?

Just as water goes through cycles of evaporation and condensation – a process of transformation and renewal – before falling as rain, human lives are marked out by cycles of growth, change and renewal. Change is inevitable and each phase contributes to the broader tapestry of existence across all of life.

It could be said this marries the ebbs and flows of water with human life.

Alongside the cycle of change, there is impermanence and imperfection, unity and interconnectedness, balance and harmony not to mention nourishment and growth.

Life is characterised by impermanence: relationships evolve, careers change and health fluctuates. Life is punctuated with moments of joy and sorrow, success and failure. But these all flow together in an everchanging stream of experiences. The impermanence of life is a reminder to cherish each moment and adapt to the ever-changing circumstances.

Water connects disparate elements of the natural world. Just as it connects oceans and rivers to the atmosphere and back again, rainfall is in a constant state of flux. It connects living plants and animals as it flows through ecosystems maintaining communities, interacting together and with the physical environment.

Similarly, lives are interconnected between individuals and communities because they are bound together by shared experiences, relationships and aspirations. People rely on shared resources to benefit a wider group. And this fosters cooperation, collaboration and mutual support, enhancing resilience and wellbeing.

Communities sustain life wherever they grow.

Evidence of high rainfall in woods with impromptu streams find their own paths. They create miniature waterfalls, swirling ebbs and rushing flows, that all contribute to an aesthetic beauty both visually and audibly. These paths of fast flowing fresh water find balance between opposing forces such as gravity and buoyancy.

Evidence of balance in human life is between work and leisure, ambition and contentment, individuality and community. The balance forges a sense of fulfilment and harmony in life bringing contentment. Contentment encourages appreciation of the present moment and finds joy in life's simple pleasures that allows the pursuit of dreams.

The pursuit of dreams combines optimism with realism, while also acknowledging and preparing for challenges and uncertainties.

Where people cultivate hope, water cultivates growth. Both cultivate resilience: water adapts to its surroundings as it ebbs and flows down roads and falls from the hills; while humans evolve in response to changing circumstances and adapt to challenges, sometimes brought about by rain.

Barrie's Jubilee gift

If you've ever visited the famous Caen Hill Lock flight on the Kennet & Avon Canal, you may have passed by our young woodland, planted in 2012 to mark the Queen's Jubilee. For years, canal enthusiast and nature lover, Barrie Barrett, was a regular visitor. And the future of Jubilee Wood is now more secure after he kindly left a generous gift in his Will to care for it in years to come.

Over the last twelve years, Barrie, born and bred in the nearby village of Rowde, looked on with pride as 30,000 native oak, birch hornbeam, chestnut, cherry, crab apple and ash trees have gently grown and matured on the site.

His friend, neighbour and Will executor, Di Buckland, remembers: "Barrie and I have known each for most of my life. When my husband died forty years ago, you could almost say Barrie and his wife adopted me. They looked after me so well.

"I'd describe Barrie as a real country chap. When he was a little boy, he used to play on the lane leading down to the canal. He loved wildlife and everything to do with the canal. When the wood was established, we went down and helped to plant some trees. Later, Barrie would go down there to see the deer, foxes and rabbits. He even gave guided walks along the canal."

That's where many of our Canal & River Trust colleagues got to know Barrie too, like ecologist Laura Mullholland. She says: "I remember going round to Barrie's house to see his collection of canal photos, documents and archive with our heritage adviser at the time. And he was clearly really, really enthusiastic about the canal and tree planting.


"Then a few years later after his wife passed away, he got in touch again and we said to him, why don't you come down to the woods with us and we'll plant another tree in her memory. I think he was very pleased with that."

And Di feels that's as much of a tribute as Barrie would now want too. "He wouldn't want money wasting on anything that's not practical. He would have been happy with an English tree next to his wife."

With £20,000 left by Barrie to help maintain the wood in years to come, there's plenty of room for growth at Jubilee Woods. The mix of broadleaf, native deciduous and fruit trees is now taking shape. Yet there's a constant need for replanting every few years as some trees die, or others fall victim to disease like ash-dieback.

A dynamic group of volunteers will also benefit from Barrie's support. Every year, they help to clear tree guards as trunks grow stouter, remove competing brambles from around the roots and mow back pathways through the wood, so local people can explore and look for woodland wildlife that's now making a home here. "We've got harvest mice that make nests within the tree guards," says Laura. "And amazing wasp spiders that have this lovely yellow and black stripe on their abdomen and make huge webs between the grass tussocks. There are badgers, hedgehogs, slow worms and grass snakes. And lots of frogs, toads, smooth newts and dragonflies. It's a few years off yet, but there's a colony of barbastelle bats nearby that could roost here eventually, as they are only found in woodland."

With willow sculptures, a bandstand, room for forest schools and picnic benches, the wood is already a big part of the local community. And now, just as Barrie would have wanted, it will continue to grow and welcome the next generation to the canalside.

...AND DID YOU KNOW?

Di Buckland has sent us three photographs of old Rowde from the late Rowde historian Barrie Barrett's collection. Do you recognise where they have been taken? They are not dated but we guess they are from around 1900.



The old Fish Bridge (called that as it resembled a fish's belly) at the end of Marsh Lane where the railway line crossed the A361 Devizes to Bath road. The girders were replaced in 1901 with more modern ones.

Bromham and Rowde Halt railway station

Bromham and Rowde Halt was the railway station serving Bromham and Rowde in Wiltshire, England between 1909 and 1966. The station was a stop on the Devizes Branch Line, between Seend and Devizes.

The single-platform halt was at Sells Green in the north-east of Seend parish, close to the Devizes–Melksham road.[1] It handled vegetables grown in the Bromham area, as well as milk.

After the completion of the Devizes line in 1858, the junction at Holt allowed the fastest route from London to the West Country. However, the Devizes line lost to competition and returned to a branch line in 1900.

Bromham and Rowde suffered from reduced traffic after the completion of the Patney and Chirton-Westbury line, that by-passed the Devizes Branch Line to shorten the London to Bristol journey by five miles. As a result, Bromham and Rowde later lost its stationmaster in 1952.

The line and the halt were closed in 1966 under the Beeching cuts and the station was demolished in 1970.

DID YOU KNOW?

You will probably have heard by now that the application to build houses off Sand's Lane has been refused by Planning Officers at Wiltshire Council.

I explained at the last Parish Council meeting that recently Wiltshire had been unable to prove that it had a 5-year land supply, which left the county open to speculative applications. I worked with ClIr Richard Clewer the Leader of Wiltshire Council to lobby central government to get this changed. In December 2023, the government announced that Local Authorities whose Local Plan is nearly completed only have to demonstrate a 4-year land supply.

Wiltshire's Local Plan is nearly completed and can demonstrate a 4-year land supply, so the Sand's Lane application was assessed against the new guidance via the revised NPPF framework. The key objections included the site being outside of the settlement boundary, the number of new builds exceeding the housing target for the village, the site being in open countryside and issues with flooding and archaeology.

It is important to remember that Rowde still has a housing target to build an additional 47 houses by 2038 so the community must work with the Devizes Area Neighborhood Steering Group to find suitable potential sites. The Minutes from the February Rowde Parish Council meeting give a full explanation.





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YOUR PCC PHILIP WILKINSON

After a period of public consultation, I presented my final proposal for the policing precept of your council tax to the Police and Crime Panel this month.

Wiltshire Police is facing increased financial pressures as we strive to deliver the necessary service improvements required, which led to the panel supporting my decision to increase the precept by 5.2%, an extra £1.09 a month or £13 a year for the average Band D property.

This, alongside a grant from the government, accounts for the core budget for policing in the county. The decision to increase the precept has been a difficult but necessary one. I am listening to residents when they tell me that they want a better and improved service from both the police and wider criminal justice system with improved outcomes and more visibility.

The public voted in favour of the rise, with 85% of respondents to my recent Policing, Priorities and ££s survey saying they wanted to see more investment in policing. Whilst key improvements have been delivered over past 12 months, including a fourfold improvement in positive outcomes for Rape and Serious Sexual Offences and Wittshire Police becoming one of the top performing forces nationally in disrupting county lines per head in capita, there is still much to do to make Wittshire safer as crime and policing demand becomes ever more complex.

Even by putting the precept up by \pounds 13 a year, we still need to make savings of \pounds 2.4m to cover the funding gap. We remain one of the worst funded force areas in the country, but I will continue to lobby the government for fairer funding. Both the Chief Constable and I are committed to delivering a policing service which meets an ever-changing crime picture and is fit for the future.

I am confident that with this increase we can continue to invest in key areas to maintain the improvements that we are now seeing across the board.

Villages and rural areas not immune to threat of child exploitation

I was astonished to learn recently that those criminal gangs who groom and exploit children and young people to carry out criminal activities on their behalf are now using virtual rewards to take advantage of them.

This takes the form of credit in online video games, so no longer must parents only be on the look out for new trainers, designer clothes and expensive technology if they're worried their child is being exploited, but also online enticements such as avatars and virtual currency.

Children and young people are especially vulnerable to being exploited by criminal gangs because of their age and the harm caused to themselves, their families and their communities can be devastating with violent incidents often escalating. That's why my office has backed the 'Check Your Children' campaign developed by Owen's World, a charity set up by family and friends following the death of Owen Dunn who was fatally stabbed in Swindon in December 2022

Owen was carrying a knife at the time of the stabbing, and now his family are asking parents and guardians to look out for any signs that their children may be involved in knife or gang crime. We've developed a video to explain the signs of exploitation, the reality of serious violence in Wiltshire and where they can seek further guidance and advice if they're concerned. We often think of drug and knife crime happening in our city and bigger towns, but our villages and more rural areas are not immune from the threat of county lines and serious violence, and sadly nor are the children and young people that live there.

So, my plea to parents, guardians, grandparents, and other caregivers, please 'Check your Children' don't shy away from asking the difficult questions of your children and seeking support from schools, police, Crimestoppers and the NSPCC if you need it.

National funding to tackle anti-social behaviour and violence welcomed by PCC

PCC Philip Wilkinson has welcomed the announcement of an extra £1m to be spent on tackling violence and disorder targeted in areas with high levels of anti-social behaviour in Wiltshire, as part of a national initiative led by the Home Office.

Each police force across England and Wales will receive at least £1m from central government to help drive down crime and boost public confidence in targeted areas where there is high prevalence of violence, anti-social behaviour, and illegal public drug consumption, which not only makes communities feel less safe but can fuel drug related violence.

Tackling anti-social behaviour and violent crime alongside partners in Wiltshire and Swindon is high on the PCC's agenda, with work to utilise the range of powers available to address anti-social behaviour, and better coordinate the multi-agency response to violent crime in our communities, through the Community Safety Partnerships in Swindon and Wiltshire.

Mr Wilkinson said: "After actively lobbying the government for fairer funding, I welcome this announcement from the Home Office. This hotspot funding will make a positive difference in those areas most susceptible to antisocial behaviour and our communities will be safer as a result. Tackling crimes that matter most to local communities is a clear priority in my Police and Crime Plan and I want our residents to feel safer, in addition to being safe. While the overall trend for anti-social behaviour is heading down, I recognise there remains more to do, to meet the challenges our local communities have with violence and disorder head-on, and I will continue to focus on this issue as residents have told me how important it is to them."

So far, the national approach has already been piloted in 10 areas, with over 80,000 hours of patrols in the six months since it launched. This has led to nearly 600 arrests, close to 1,500 stop and searches and around 700 uses of anti-social behaviour powers such as community protection notices and public protection orders.

T/ACC Phil Staynings, Head of Local Policing and the Neighbourhood Harm Reduction Unit said: "We welcome the recent Home Office announcement of further funding to help address issues of anti-social behaviour and related criminality. Such issues have been recognised as a key priority for the force by our Chief Constable Catherine Roper in her drive to ensure safer public spaces and tackle violent crime in the communities we serve. We are determined to robustly address criminality on our streets and this funding will provide further valuable support to allow us to tackle these issues."

I found it deeply moving to meet again so many of the Furlong Close "family" at Ali's funeral. That so many attended and joined together in sharing their memories of Ali and of the Care days is a true testament to Ali herself and to the legacy of Peter Forbes and the Care vision of a dignified home-for-life for adults with learning disabilities and autism with meaningful work, social and home life. Ali was one of the first Care Blackerton residents and moved with a group of her friends and neighbours to Furlong Close when it opened in the early 1990s. It is as a result of the steadfast support of all the families and friends of Furlong Close that she was able to live out her life in Myrtle, her home of nearly 30 years. The very moving service was led by celebrant Peter Williams who was a director of Care Rowde and knew Ali from her early days at Furlong Close.

As many will already be aware I am an action group member of the Our Life Our CHOICE campaign and it is to enlist your support, yet again, that I am emailing now.

The Our Life Our CHOICE campaign is moving into a more public phase following a year of conversations with senior officers of the Care Quality Commission during which we worked hard to persuade CQC to review its policy and guidance on so-called "campus" communities - village and intentional communities for the care and accommodation of people with severe learning disabilities and/or autism - sadly without success.


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
