

This month has seen the sale of the last of the cattle which were thankfully TB free and the Farm Equipment and Machinery Sale.

On a brighter note we have had some really lovely days at the cafe being much busier than previous years and we have been able to maintain the quality and traceability of our ice cream by using our neighbouring farm's milk from the Padfield family in Seend. We have a wonderful team of staff who have helped us adapt to the difficult times and improve our service and ensure we keep the cafe a safe and a friendly place to come.

As we look towards the Festive Season we have sold out of all our Breakfasts and Teas with Father Christmas. We are still taking bookings for Christmas lunches and afternoon teas. We also have some evenings and private Christmas functions booked in too. We have a couple of tables still available on the evenings of the 3rd and 15th December. We have other evenings available for private functions for 20 plus guests. Please see our Christmas Menu and give us a call if you would like to reserve a table. Our Sunday Roasts are really popular too so would recommend booking in advance although sometimes we are able to accommodate walk ins we can't guarantee it.



We will be open every day up until and including Christmas Eve when we will close at 3pm ready for the Rowde Crib Service which is to be held here this year. We are incredibly excited about this. THE BUZZ ABOUT BEES

Dancing Bees!



Bee Foraging for Pollen and Nectar

Some of you may have heard of the bees' dances. In this article I hope to explain a bit more about one of them, the waggle dance.

The waggle dance was first described by Karl von Frisch working at the university of Munich during the dark days of World War II. He won a Nobel prize for his work in 1973. No Nazi, with a Jewish grandmother and employing several Jewish scientists, he kept a low profile and didn't publish until after the war.

Bees forage for pollen and nectar and take it back to the hive as food for the colony. We have all seen the bees busily working their way around the flowers and flying straight back, on a beeline, to the hive when they can carry no more. Each of the foraging bees has learned where the hive is and how to get back. Some of the forages also act as scouts.

Scout bees find new sources of food and tend to be older foraging bees. They know the lie of the land and are also 'expendable'. This can be high risk work. Going into unknown areas, perhaps further than before – bees get lost. When the scout has found a new source of food, she returns to the colony and tells the other worker bees about it. She recruits them to work this new food source. How does she do this? This is the waggle dance.

In the dark interior of the hive, the scout bee traces out a figure of eight (see fig A and fig B) on the surface of a honeycomb. This is called the dance floor! She runs in a straight line waggling her abdomen very rapidly (the waggle-run), then circles round to the left and repeats (next time circling around to the right). The longer the waggle run, the further away the food is; the more violent the waggling the better the food is. She also tells the other bees the direction of the forage (see fig B). If waggle-runs are towards the top of the hive then the food is in the direction of the sun. Any angle away from the top of the hive in the dance is the angle away from the sun in which the other bees must fly to reach the food. They also get a taster (call it a free sample) of what they are looking for by smelling and tasting the scout bee and what she has brought




Fig B. Diagram of the waggle dance

back. Remember, all this dancing is done in the dark. The other bees sense the vibration of the dance in the comb and feel the scout with their antennae as she passes. Some of the bees recruited are other scouts and they will fly to the new food source. If they like it too, then they will return, dance the same dance and recruit more bees, so bigger food sources get more workers (think of a field of oil seed rape or perhaps a chestnut tree in flower).

The waggle dance is also used by bees to find new homes after the bees have swarmed, when the scouts are looking for suitable accommodation. This time the dance is done on the cluster of bees itself and the right decision is vital. A bad choice can lead to the failure of the swam.

Hft is working to improve on the recent inadequate judgement by the CQC. The Hft branded 'Furlong Close' signs have been removed from the entrance to Furlong Close to improve inclusivity in the community. New street signs have been ordered through Wiltshire Council.

Wiltshire Council undertook two tender bid processes to find an alternative provider for care, which were both unsuccessful. The friends and families of residents at Furlong Close are working with property developers to possibly purchase the site and install their own care provision.

Cllr L Mayes is regularly in touch with the families of residents at Furlong Close.

Silverwood School

Planning permission was granted for the extension to Silverwood School at the Strategic Planning Committee on Wednesday, 6th October 2021. Cllr Jane Davies, Cabinet Member for SEND, spoke in favour of the application and the Committee was unanimous in its approval. Work will start in the spring and the new facility will be ready for September 2023.

Willmott Dixon, the construction partner for the development at Silverwood School, began work with Wessex Water in the October half term to divert a water main that will clash with the proposed new classroom block. Some water pressure problems were experienced in the village.

Village matters

Planning

Neighbourhood planning

The results from the 'Visioning event' which was held jointly in Rowde (on 6/9/21), Bishops Cannings and Devizes Town have been published. The level of participation from Rowde was high. These results will help to form neighbourhood planning policies moving forward.

Reed Place

Cllr P Brown has expressed the intention for local residents to be allocated the new proposed homes at Reed Place. Wiltshire Council has advised that these homes will be advertised and allocated in accordance with the Homes4Wiltshire policy, the priority of which is local connection based, before cascading out to surrounding Parishes and beyond. Cllr Mayes stated that it is essential that Rowde residents, identified by the 2019 housing need survey and who are in need of the proposed affordable homes in Rowde, should register with Homes4Wiltshire to apply when the homes become available. (see also article on pages 25 and 26, Ed)

Planning Applications

PL/2021/09262: Plot 5, Ox House Farm, Rowde, Devizes, SN10 2LU (dog walking field). Variation of condition 1 (approved plans and documents) on 17/00684/FUL to allow for changes to hours of operation. Deadline for consultation: 9/11/21

The Parish Council had no objections.

21/02406/FUL Caen Hill Marina, Lower Foxhangers, Rowde, Devizes, Wilts, SN10 1SS. The installation of 10 No. Camping Pods at Caen Hill. Response date 15/11/21. The Parish Council did not have any objections.

PL/2021/09910: 33 Tower View, Rowde, Devizes, Wilts, SN10 2PR Householder planning permission Formation of new vehicular access to. Response date: 25/11/21. The Parish Council did not have any objections to the application, but they queried whether the whole area was in the ownership of the applicant. There were concerns about the loss of further general parking spaces due to the new proposed access. The Parish Council were also concerned about the access crossing over a pavement.

PL/2021/09965 Lower Farm, Devizes Road, Rowde, Devizes Wilts, SN10 2LX. Permanent stationing of a static caravan for use as a residential annex. Response date 1/12/21. The Parish Council did not object to the application provided the annex continue to be connected to the existing building and that no one lives there independently.

Highways

Cllr C Greenwood and the Clerk attended the Community Area Transport Group (CATG) meeting on 9/11/21. A substantive bid has been made by Wiltshire Council on behalf of the Parish Council for funds to create a footpath in Tanis.

The Parish Council is required to submit evidence to the Community Area Transport Group to justify installing a Speed Indicator Device (S.I.D). Wiltshire Council strongly advise identifying three to four locations for the S.I.D to be moved regularly too.

- The Parish Steward has been asked to cut back the foliage around the 30mph sign by Silverwood School.
- The Parish Council has purchased a new grit bin for Rowde Court Road, at the back entrance to St Matthew's Church. The Parish Council has requested the purchase of a further two grit bins: one for Springfield Road, in front of no. 29, a second for the entrance to the Tower View cul-de-sac.
- The Parish Council thanked Fraser Drake for cutting the grass on the Common and for clearing the ditch in the recent torrential weather.

Footpaths & Cycleways

- Jim Butler has proposed a new cycle track from Bromham to Braeside. This proposal is being discussed with the Merchant Venturers. It was noted that Cllr Tamara Reay is putting together a similar scheme for Potterne.
- M Somerville & G Raine were thanked for their work on the Hangings footpath, to strim back the overgrowth and to repair the fencing.
- The stile has been replaced at the start of footpath ROWD24. However, the stile at the other side of the field on that footpath has collapsed and needs to be repaired. The bridge across the ditch is also in a dangerous condition.
- Cllr D Pullen reported that corrugated sheets have been used along footpaths in the village (BROM76).
 These need to be filled with gravel, otherwise they become slippery when wet and then dangerous.

- Several people have volunteered to form a footpath working party. Cllr D Pullen has asked that a risk assessment is carried out first. The Parish Council will also need to purchase some tools.
- There has been an application to re-route footpaths (ROWD5 & ROWD2) away from Rowdefield Farm. The Parish Council supported this application.

Play areas

- The safety reports have been received and some remedial work has been recommended for the play areas. The damaged back of the grind box in the skate park has been repaired, along with the vandalised (recently replaced) wet pour in the toddlers' play area in the Tower View Play Area.
- One of the multi activity walls in the Tower View play area has been damaged. Both walls will be moved, and one will be put into storage. The other one will be re-sited to the centre of the Tower View play area.
- The Parish Council has asked for the quotations for replacement fencing to be revised with new measurements.
- The toddlers' picnic table will be replaced.

Allotments

Cllr S Green reported some concern about unworked plots but also noted that it is not the right time of year for much gardening to take place.

The Parish Council has made a donation on behalf of Jim Butler to Dorothy House for the digestate that he kindly donated to allotment holders.

If you are interested in having an allotment plot, please contact Cllr Green for more details.

National Grid

A representative from National Grid attended the Parish Council meeting on 20th October 2021 to give a presentation on the Visual Improvement Scheme (VIP) which will remove the electricity pylons across Roundway Down and place the cables underground.



'CATCH A FALLING STAR' - ROWDE FRIENDS REUNITED!

This lovely story is formed from email exchanges between recently reconnected ex-Rowde residents Kenneth Bull and Richard Cross. Ed

Hi Richard, it was absolutely fantastic chatting with you on the phone the other day. What a genuine pleasure after all these years. My mind has been running wild ever since with memories of Rowde, so I hope you don't mind if I pester you at times for help in filling in some gaps!

However, I wanted you to thank Sue for her memory of us singing together. It suddenly made sense of a memory I have of Shetland. It goes as follows;



Yell in the Shetland Islands

We arrived in Shetland after leaving Rowde in 1958 and lived with my grandparents on their croft on the island of Yell. No electricity.

No piped water. No roads. Very remote and basic. It's also important to remember that while most houses had a 'radio', they were monster wireless boxes with valves that ran off acid-filled accumulators that ran out of power very quickly. Also, being so far north, reception was very poor so the

wireless was used sparingly for the BBC news and nothing much else. This meant the local kids had little idea of what the latest popular songs were.

So Margaret and I started attending our local primary school where we swelled the numbers from seven to nine! Plus one teacher and one cook. We had no idea what anyone was saying as the local dialect was like a foreign language to us. Then to my horror I was later told that us school kids would be putting on a Christmas concert in the local community hall. Songs, plays, poems, jokes. Just the nine of us putting on a full-blown concert to a packed hall.

I was to sing a song with my cousin Norma. Help! I was getting really worried until I was told the name of the song. CATCH A FALLING STAR!

I knew the tune and the words so that was okay then. Poor Norma had to start learning it from scratch. And on the night we didn't just sing the song but we acted out the whole bit about catching a star, putting it in your pocket as well as, to my mortification, "Just in case you feel you wanna hold her". But we got through it and finished with a great round of applause.



And that was all thanks to us kids in Rowde singing songs together. Which is made all the more special when you said that it's something Sue can remember. So a big thank you to you and Sue for making my first Shetland school Christmas concert much, much easier than it might otherwise have been.

I'm so chuffed to be in touch again and hope I didn't spoil your bread-making!

MAN'S BODY FOUND IN CANAL AT ROWDE

A police investigation was underway to identify a body of a man found in the Kennet & Avon Canal in Rowde on the morning of 30th October.

The body was found shortly before 9am by a member of the public close to the Caen Hill locks at Marsh Lane, Rowde. Police cordoned off the area while they investigated. Dorset & Wiltshire Fire and Rescue Service was also called out.



A Wiltshire Police spokesman said: "Our investigations are currently ongoing to establish the identity of the person, with a scene in place."

It is was not known whether the man's death was as the result of an accident or something more suspicious.

He is described as a white man, aged between 60 and 70 years old, of slim build, approximately 5 foot 8 inches tall. He has a medium length, full white beard, with receding white hair with dark strands running through it.

He was wearing rectangular rimmed glasses, with black arms, one of which had black colour tape around it and he was wearing a navy-blue Spray Way waterproof coat, black trousers with holes in them and black, lace-up shoes.

Police are also appealing for anyone who may have seen this man on the morning of his body being discovered or the evening before and ask that anyone in the local area check their CCTV or doorbell cameras to understand his whereabouts in the lead up to his death.

Anyone who can help is asked to call 101 as a matter of urgency, quoting reference number 54210105897.

PLANS FOR 10 NEW COUNCIL HOUSES IN ROWDE

Plans for a new estate of 10 council houses and flats in Rowde have been submitted.

Wiltshire Council has confirmed its intentions to build 10 new houses on land east of Reed Place, Rowde.

According to the planning documents, the council plans to build two one-bedroom houses, two one-bedroom flats, two two-bed bungalows, three two-bedroom houses and one three-bedroom property.

Cabinet member for housing, Phil Alford said the housing is part of the council's decade long development plan to increase the number of affordable housing in Wiltshire.



In June 2017, the local authority had developed on land adjacent to the new site, and in 2019 conducted a rural housing survey which showed the need for more homes in Rowde.

Cllr Alford continued, "With the land being in Wiltshire Council ownership and the need identified by the Housing Register, we took the decision to proceed with a planning application to develop this neighbouring piece of land to meet the growing housing need. If planning permission is granted, it is intended that the site would be one of three sites that will pilot a Modern Method of Construction (off-site manufacturing) that would enable the manufacture of the units to take place at the same time as the groundworks.

This should reduce the time taken and the environmental impact of traffic on the site. It is anticipated that the planned project would potentially be completed by summer 2022, however this would be reliant on contractor availability and essential utility connections."

FURLONG CLOSE SIGN TO BE REPLACED TO DELIGHT OF FAMILY GROUP

The branding has been a source of upset since it was installed. A spokesman for the Families and Friends of Furlong Close said they were delighted by the removal.

The group added that since it was given an inadequate rating from the Care Quality Commission, Hft had strengthened the management and made positive steps to address the safeguarding issues at the complex. Hft has asked Wiltshire Council about a new road sign for the street in Rowde.

In a statement it said: "The CQC's guidance sets out the regulator's desire that the homes of those in the community who have disability are indistinguishable from all other homes in the locality and for this reason the CQC requests that care providers should not display any branded signage.

The removal of the sign by Hft is yet another very positive step in the collaborative approach being followed by Hft and the Families and Friends in their united desire to ensure that Furlong Close regains its Good ratings on all categories inspected by the regulator.

To that end a successful first meeting has been held between Hft management and representatives of the Families and Friends and it is intended that this monitoring group shall meet regularly to discuss care on site and in particular to discuss Hft's rapid response to concerns expressed by CQC in its most recent inspection report."

Hft regional director for the south west, Emma Bagley said: "The Hft sign at the entrance to Furlong Close was removed just over a week ago and we have contacted the local authority about a private road sign for the street."

The Families and Friends spokesman added: "These are positive moves in building a constructive relationship with Hft which will pave the way for a viable, sustainable future for Furlong Close and its current and future residents."

FURLONG CLOSE UPDATE

Back in October 2020, the families and residents were in despair at the shock news that Hft and Wiltshire Council had arrived at a joint decision to close Furlong Close down and force its vulnerable residents to move elsewhere. Little did we think then that we would now be in the advanced stages of putting in place a plan to acquire the site from Hft and modernise it, so that our relatives can remain in their homes, with their longstanding carers, under the management of a new care provider.

We have had to fight hard to get to where we now are and we could not have done it without the unstinting support of the local community in Rowde. We are now hopeful that we have the support we need from Wiltshire Council to carry our plans to fruition, but if the Council drags its feet we will let you know and ask the village to remind them that the residents of Furlong Close are very much part of our community. As the children of Rowdeford School wrote earlier this year in an open letter — "We are Rowde and so are they!".

Soon, we will be seeking to engage directly with the local community in Rowde and Devizes about our plans, so that we can hear any suggestions people might have about how we could enhance Furlong Close as an asset both for the residents and the local community and ensure an even closer engagement between the residents and the village moving forward. The residents and their families are incredibly grateful for the support shown to them by the people of Rowde, which has sustained them through this difficult time and has made a great contribution to getting us this far.

JOHN'S AMAZING CHARITY BIKE RIDE

In memory of my partner Delia Harris, I decided to do a ride around Britain visiting all 92 Football League stadiums,12 Rugby Union stadiums and all 18 first class Cricket stadiums. I then followed that by adding all first class stadiums in Scotland in total 167 sporting venues!

This took me 14 days, completing 5377 miles! I started off in Bristol on my trusty old Honda 250 Superdream then later changed over to a 650 Honda Deauville. Daily trips of between 3 to 400 miles up through the middle of the country to Swindon, Northampton, Leicester, Nottingham, Derby and Birmingham starting each day at about 8am and usually not stopping until gone 10pm.

Off to the south coast, up in to South London with a stop off at Herne Bay then a day riding around London which was just so hard! After a puncture in Watford I then went on a journey up to Cheltenham, Worcester, Stoke, Mansfield, Rotherham and a stop over in Sheffield. Next was Yorkshire then up to Middlesbrough, through gale force winds and horrific conditions and on to Newcastle across the A69, enduring horrendous rain to get to Annan.

Oh yes, the beautiful coast of Scotland, going up through the Ayrshire coast was just stunning ..arriving at Glasgow, Greenock and the Erskine Bridge then up through Glencoe, Fort William and a stop in Buckie. I would recommend this to anyone. It was then on to Aberdeen and down the East Coast; Montrose, Arbroath, Dundee and a night in wonderful Edinburgh.

Next day, on to Cowdenbeath, Stirling, Alloa and Perthshire then heading back down to England for a stop in Morecombe.

The Friday saw me doing 558 miles, starting at 7.30am and getting home Saturday morning at 01.45 hours, visiting Blackpool, Preston, Burnley then on to Manchester, Bolton, Wigan, Liverpool,



Crewe, Shrewsbury, Wolverhampton, Gloucester then home. I then had to go to Wales and back before heading off to Luton, Cambridge, down to Essex, Ipswich, Norwich and Peterborough, Lincoln, Hull, Doncaster and a long trip towards home and finishing with a little trip to Bath Rugby ground before ending up at Dorothy House.

I was joined by Charlie Carter and my friend Steve Bird down to Exeter and Plymouth ..popping in to Somerset Cricket.

Thank you to Wayne Fell who serviced the bike and special thanks to Gema, Taya and Liam for their fantastic love and support from start to finish. This was the hardest thing I have done! It was just so mentally draining and physically demanding but knowing what this was for just drove me on.

I have to say a big thank you from myself, Gema, Taya and Liam to the NHS and DOROTHY HOUSE for the fabulous care given to Delia and thank you everyone from the bottom of our hearts for your very kind and generous donations which helped me raise a total of £4509.36 which will be split 50/50 between both charities.



FAKE DOOR TO DOOR SELLERS

Devizes Community Police Team intercepted a Nottingham Knocker recently in the Potterne area, following a call from a concerned resident.

Nottingham Knockers go door to door, selling household items at a usually inflated price. They show fake ID and will tell you that they are trying to get their life back together. Whilst this may be true, the practice of selling on the doorstep is illegal (Peddling without a license).

Often, the person will make note of vulnerable addresses, such as elderly residents, and pass these addresses on to unlicensed traders, with the resident possibly becoming a target which could result in them parting with a lot of money for usually sub-standard work.

There is a good chance they will continue to be in the area this week and, if you receive a visit from them, we advise you to politely decline to buy anything from them, close the door and call us on 101, giving a brief description and direction of travel. They won't have a vehicle with them as they are dropped off and collected later by a leader.


