
ROWDE BOOK CLUB



NEWS FROM ROWDE PRIMARY ACADEMY

Our bright start leads to their bright future

It has been a while since I've had a chance to write and update you all on what has been happening at Rowde Primary School. What an unusual winter it has been! We have, like everyone, been busy adjusting to the 'new normal' of Covid restrictions and limitations, and these have inhibited our wishes to get back out in to the village community. Even so, life at school has continued apace and much is going on to return the school to its very best. In September we welcomed two superb new teachers to the school, Miss Adams and Miss Johns, who, in addition to teaching Years 3 and 4, have taken on the leadership of sport and music at Rowde. These are two areas in which we are determined to become a centre for excellence. Piano, guitar and singing lessons are back, we have a new Music curriculum in place for all pupils, Bath Rugby are now here every Thursday working with every year group and plans are underway for a summer-built Multi-Use Games Area. This 'MUGA' will also be available for community use. Before long, we will have musical and sporting facilities that are the envy of other schools – and our young people deserve nothing less.



Over the Autumn, Acorn were in installing new wi-fi and Interactive Smart Boards, and lots of new computers, laptops and iPads for the pupils to use. This was a considerable investment, but much-needed; the system had not been updated since the school was built!

We also managed, within the restrictions in place, to have an excellent Christmas week, with an online nativity, a visit from Santa Claus, the traditional



Christmas meal, and ice creams for everyone courtesy of the Rowdey Cow. We missed visiting St Matthew's, but hope to be back there very soon. Other exciting projects soon coming to fruition include an Art project in collaboration with North Wilts Arts Society in the Spring, in which two visiting artists will work with children on pieces for inside and outside and school building, and a number of author visits. In February, we will re-start the Monday community lunches which some of you will have attended already, hosted by Year 6 pupils. Plans are underway too for the children to grow their own fruit and veg on the school site. For the first time since March 2020, it feels like a bustling school again.





Ofsted are yet to call, and the inspection cycle means it is likely that they will leave us alone for much of this academic year. This is disappointing, because three independent visits have confirmed that the school has addressed the shortcomings found in 2019, and is well on the way to being back to its best. It is reassuring that every visitor remarks upon how different the school now is; please do come and see for yourself.

SIMONA'S STORY



Simone, Jay, Luca and Lief

"The idea of living on a boat wasn't really on our minds before moving to Bath. We were renting a flat in the centre, yet neither of us felt comfortable in a town. We felt confined to this box with no garden. We'd just been travelling around Australia and India and missed the connection to nature, the freedom, harmony and fresh air that you get living in the countryside, where you can just walk out of your gate into a field or a forest. It's not easy to find that space if your living in a town or suburb, yet the house prices to be close to nature are extortionate – it's completely unaffordable, particularly for young people.

We'd taken a walk along the canal by Sydney Gardens and met a man called Simon who was a real character, he had some really nice things to say about the canal and it just felt like we'd landed. It was amazing to find somewhere affordable that we could live, surrounded by like-minded people, in nature. It was perfect, especially if you are already a traveller and you like that way of life – somewhere settled yet still able to move. There was something about the canal and the community here that we fell completely in love with.

It's a beautiful part of the country with a very broad spectrum of people living on boats

– something for everyone, someone for everyone. It's nice to have a space that feels safe for the children to grow up in. On a boat you're always aware of your resources and where they come from; you know not to waste water, you know what happens to your toilets, you're aware of your electricity and you don't just take these things for granted. We've been on this canal 18 years and though we now have a permanent mooring, we still feel very connected to the community and feel we made the right choice moving onto the canal all those years ago."

"Life on the canal has offered us many gifts. It gives us the freedom to move whilst having the security of a home. It connects us with nature and forces us outside to experience the beauty of every weather. There's a lot of mud. And a lot of putting on and taking off of waterproofs, but it's a small price to pay to be a part of the magic of the landscape everyday. To be there in the first snow, unmuddied by a single footprint. To feel the quiet as the day reveals like frames in a silent movie - snowflakes falling on a frozen canal. And the joy. The joy of having the most wonderful friends and neighbours to share it with."



Parish Council Meetings

Since the last edition of the Rowde Village News, the Parish Council has met on 8th December 2021 and 14th January 2022.

Our community First Aid Training

Update on Hft, Furlong Close – Clir Mayes

Hft received a Notice of Decision before Christmas from the Care Quality Commission for Furlong Close to close. An appeal has been lodged against the decision. Wiltshire Council has a statutory duty to actively search for alternative placements for Furlong Close residents while there is a prospect that Furlong Close would close. However, the Friends and Families group are working with a developer to purchase the land and business.

The Families and Friends liaison group continue to meet with Hft management fortnightly to be briefed on the progress of Hft's action plan to improve their CQC ratings. Wiltshire Council continues to meet with families to support them through the process.

Silverwood School

The building programme continues to go well. The project is on schedule to meet the current published timescales. Key developments:

 Highways have approved the use of the Lodge entrance for all construction traffic, subject to the operation of a manually operated traffic light system (this will also minimise impact on other road users).

The Parish Council were concerned that a permanent second entrance is no longer being considered by Wiltshire Council.

Council tax - Village Precept

The Parish Council voted to increase the precept by 2%. The precept for 2022-2023 will be £39, 026. Payments for band D households will increase by £1.54 per annum to £78.47/yr.

Wessex Water

Some residents have complained about a drop in water pressure in the village. The Clerk and Cllr Mayes have both contacted Wessex Water with regards to the problem. Wessex Water have equalized the water pressure between Rowde and Bromham, as there were some houses in Bromham which had very low water pressure. The resources have been shared equally between the two villages.

Planning

Neighbourhood planning

Rowde Parish has been asked to gather information on three topics: local green spaces; non-designated heritage assets; and F class buildings to feed into the Neighbourhood Plan.

The results from the 'Visioning event' which was held jointly in Rowde (on 6/9/21), Bishops Cannings and Devizes Town have been published. The level of participation from Rowde was high. These results will help to form neighbourhood planning policies moving forward.

Planning Applications

PL/2021/11921 Holm Leigh, Devizes Road, Rowde, Devizes, SN10 2LU. This application is for retrospective planning to site a portacabin on the front drive. The Parish Council did not have any comments on the application.

Highways

 The Clerk has requested a metro count for Devizes Road (near to the Conscience Lane junction) to establish a fourth location for the Speed Indicator Device.

It was agreed to start the process of installing the Speed Indicator Device as soon as possible.

Discussion of work by Parish Steward

- It was noted that the pavement along Devizes
 Road to Dunkirk Hill has grown over again. The Parish
 Steward has already cut back the hedge along this path.
- The Parish Steward will also be asked to cut back the hedge that is overhanging the pavement at the entrance to the bungalows on Rowde Court Road (adjacent to the back entrance to St Matthew's Church).
- The Clerk was asked for the potholes in the layby on Devizes Road to be filled.

Footpaths & Cycleways

- A cost for tools which can be used by the footpath maintenance group has been obtained. It was proposed by D Pullen, seconded by C Greenwood, agreed by all Councillors to purchase the tools.
- It was recorded that a tree has fallen at the Hangings. The Parish Council will look at removing this.
- The Parish Council thanks R Hillier for the work that he has carried out on the ditch along the permissive path.

The Common

- It is reported that the work to lay fibre cable along the Common has resulted in damage to the grass verge. It has been scraped back and not re-laid. A Parish Councillor has requested that the verge is reseeded.
- People are parking along the grass verges along the Common and damaging the verge. The Clerk has been asked to purchase 'No Parking on the verge' signs.
- The Clerk has reported issues with fly tipping green waste in the ditches along the Common to Wiltshire Council.
- The Parish Council thanked F Drake & L Tovey for cutting the grass on the Common and for clearing the ditch during recent rainfall.

Play areas

Large playing field

Changing facilities are needed at the large playing field to facilitate use by the Club that currently uses the pitches. The Parish Council has discussed obtaining a steel container, welfare hut or mobile classroom to use as interim changing facilities. The space needs to be 40ft x 10ft and ideally would be sold on afterwards.

Other matters

- Dog walking is not permitted on any of the playing fields in the village. These areas are for sports and recreation, and it is really unpleasant to do this amongst dog faeces.
- A pedestrian barrier will be installed at the entrance to the playing field adjacent to the tennis court. This is to prevent vehicles from driving on the field.
- There are large potholes on the track to the playing field.
 J Dalley will lead a working party to fill these holes.
- The Clerk obtained three quotations for the work identified in the tree survey to be carried out. The Parish

Council decided not to accept any of the quotations and to carry out the work themselves. C Greenwood will form a working party to carry out the work.

 The Parish Council thanked P Dalley for repairing the Jubilee Gate.

Small playing field Fencing

 The Clerk presented three revised quotes to remove the chain link fencing along the Tower View side of the playing field and replace with new. A preferred contractor was chosen, on the proviso that the price quoted included security fencing and that the start date can be arranged before Spring 2022.

The preferred contractor has confirmed that they will secure the site with Heras fencing. The lead time for installation was four to five weeks from the time that the order was placed.

There is a site meeting with the contractor on 20th January to establish which trees need to be kept along the hedge line.

Moving the Multi Use Games Area (MUGA)

 The MUGA post in front of the Tower View side fence will be moved and put into storage.

Silverlands Play area – update

The legal transfer for the play area has been lodged by Wiltshire Council with the Parish Council's solicitor. There are some covenants imposed on the future use of the land. Funds will come to the Parish Council for the renovation and maintenance of the play area.

A Message from Rev'd Ruth

Dear Friends.

Since Covid hit, in our house we've found ourselves watching more films at home, some old favourites, but mixed in with some new releases. Just a couple of weeks ago, our movie-night choice was "Don't Look Up", a film by Adam McKay, about a fictional disaster – an approaching comet on a collision course with the earth. The film follows a pair of scientists who first notice the comet, and their attempts to warn humanity. Spoiler alert – it doesn't end well.

"Don't Look Up" isn't really about comets. It points to climate change, and ways in which the news media and governments fail to take proper account of the huge risks we face as a planet. It's a heart-breaking story, but quite satirical too, and pokes fun at the personal ambitions and power struggles that ultimately end in disaster for everyone. It begs the question what are we doing about the climate crisis?

I've heard it said that if we knew the risks that we face every day, we would never cross the road. And there is some justification for us needing to get on with our lives – there are plenty of struggles that we all face day to day. And yet that should always be balanced by looking out for the bigger issues that face us, especially if they are also issues of justice – the warming climate is already having an impact on the developing world, and on communities who can't protect themselves.

Various Christian organisations are co-ordinating action to raise awareness of the climate emergency, such as Operation Noah and Christian Climate Action. Others encourage us to take action in our own lives, such as Eco Church and Christian Ecology Link. The more of us that get involved in looking at the problem with love for others in our hearts, the more likely I believe we are to avoid the worst effects of climate change.



After a long struggle to get here, the families are now working with an investor in specialised supported housing and a well-established and respected care provider, to put the finishing touches to a plan to modernise and refurbish Furlong Close, so that it can be saved as a long-term home for the current and future residents. A critical part of those plans is to preserve and enhance the links between the residents



and the local community and restore to Furlong Close many of the historical activities which were so important to the quality of life of the residents and their integration into the community life of Rowde and Devizes.

Soon, we will be seeking to engage directly with our supporters and the local community in Rowde about our plans, so that we can hear your views about how we could enhance Furlong Close as an asset both for the residents and the local community. 

LIFE ON THE ALLOTMENTS

THE BUZZ ABOUT BEES

Sweetness and Light

Current interest in what we can do for the bees has arisen from a concern for the environment and a need to protect our pollinators. However – in times gone by it was more about what the bees could do for us. Before cane sugar started to be imported from the West Indies, honey was the only available way to sweeten food. Used in cooking, brewing and medicines honey must have been a valued commodity and a rare treat. However, more valuable still was beeswax. With its uses including medicines, seals and above all candles, beeswax was traded across Europe and North Africa. Its quality was assured in this country by law and the Wax Chandlers guild – which is still in existence today. Candles made of beeswax burn with a dean flame and produce little smoke, in comparison cheaper tallow (rendered animal fat) candles, would be smoky with a strong and sometimes rancid smell. This meant beeswax candles were very desirable in religious (and rich) houses so bees and hives were often kept by monasteries and in wealthy homes, as well as by cottagers and farmers.



Sampling the mead

Beehives as we recognize them now started to be used in this country in the mid to late 1800s and, as they are very convenient for the beekeeper, their use spread rapidly. The bees don't care what they are in – as long as it is big enough (around 40 litres in volume), dry and defensible, they will set up home. Prior to this time wicker or straw baskets called skeps were used –like the woven straw hive shown in fig A. Skeps were almost entirely replaced by the beginning of the 20th century, although the odd beekeeper was still using them until the 1960s. One or two are appearing again, adopted by some 'alternative' beekeepers but they do present technical challenges.

Skeps were made from coiled straw or willow, bound together with willow withies. Sticks were sometimes pushed through the sides for the bees to perch on.

The skep would need further weather proofing and several methods were used. It could be kept in a barn (sometimes a special one just for the bees); the skep could be cloamed (liberally coated with a daggy mixture containing mainly cow dung and allowed to dry); it could be covered with a hackle (a wigwam made of straw (see fig B)) or the skep could be housed in a bee bole (see fig C). This is an alcove in a wall - sometimes a house wall. Bee boles are of many designs and are found in many odd places: farms, cottages, monasteries and grand houses, all over the country with several dozen recorded in Wiltshire.

One of the main problems with the skep was harvesting the honey and wax, as the combs were firmly stuck in the skep by the bees and in practice the bees were often killed to get their produce (which

is certainly frowned upon these days!). The honey would be drained out of the wax and the wax would be washed before further cleaning and making into candles. The washings would have a bit more honey added, a little yeast, fermented and matured, to make mead. Perhaps one reason why monks were thought to be merry!





According to one legend, Valentine was a third century Roman priest who secretly married couples after Emperor Claudius II outlawed marriage for young men, because he thought single men made better soldiers. Another legend suggests that Valentine was killed for helping Christians escape Roman prisons and sent the first "valentine" to a woman who visited him while he was imprisoned, signing it "from your Valentine," a phrase that's still found on valentine cards to this day. Regardless of the origin stories, they all set Valentine up as a heroic, romantic figure, and by the Middle Ages, Valentine was one of the most beloved saints of both England and France.

From Goat's Blood To Poetry

History goes on to note that Valentine's Day falls in the month of February possibly because of the Christian church's attempt to "Christianize" a pagan fertility festival called Lupercalia, which was celebrated during the ides of February, or February 15. This involved Roman priests, known as the Luperci, gathering at a sacred cave to sacrifice a goat, to encourage fertility, and a dog, for purification purposes. The priests would then take to the streets holding strips of goat flesh dipped in sacrificial blood and gently slap both women and fields with the goat hide to encourage fertility. The day supposedly ended with women putting their names in an urn, at which point

Rome's single men would choose a name from the urn and the couple would then spend the next year together, often marrying at the end.

Lupercalia was later outlawed near the end of the fifth century, at which point Pope Galasius declared February 14 to be St. Valentine's Day. The day's romantic connotations didn't begin until much later, perhaps connected to the belief from the Middle Ages that birds' mating season begins on February 14. The first mention of Valentine's Day as a day celebrating romantic love is thought to have come from Geoffrey Chaucer in 1375 with a line from the poem "Parliament of Foules": "For this was sent on Seynt Valentyne's day / Whan every foul cometh ther to choose his mate." Written valentine greetings appeared in the 15th century.

The Oldest Valentine Is Very, Very Old



The oldest valentine that still exists today a is poem written in 1415 by Charles, Duke of Orleans, to his wife during his imprisonment in the Tower of London. The note resides in the British Library in London. By the middle of the 18th century, it was a common practice for friends and lovers to "exchange small tokens of affection or handwritten notes," per History, with printed cards commonly replacing letters by 1900. In the United States, Esther A. Howland is thought to have popularized the ornate and elaborate creations we associate with valentines when she started making and selling such cards in the 1840s.

Today, Valentine's Day is the second-largest card-sending holiday, after Christmas. Per Hallmark, about 145 million Valentine's Day cards are exchanged throughout the world, and that doesn't count the little cards children traditionally give each other in classrooms via shoebox and construction paper "mailboxes." Hallmark first offered valentine cards in 1913 and began producing them in 1916, making the slightly cynical phrase "Hallmark holiday" simplistic when it comes to considering the long history behind Valentine's Day, but not entirely inaccurate when one considers how much money the company stands to make on a day when there are 145 million cards to be sold.
