

ROWDE ARTISTS WIN AWARDS AT WILTSHIRE EXHIBITION Oexmann Art Award Exhibition 2022

On Wednesday 30 November, the Oexmann Art Competition judges came to the Wiltshire Museum in Devizes to make some very difficult decisions. The exhibition opened to the public on Saturday 17 December (to 18 February 2023), with the prize giving taking place on Saturday 14 January 2023. A total of 395 artworks were submitted this year: 306 in the General Adult category and 89 in the Young Persons categories and I am thrilled to announce that the judges awarded The Drawing Prize to Alan Watters of Rowde for his entry -One Day (Greta Thunberg).

In addition, Ann Swan, also of Rowde, was awarded two Highly Commended certificates for her exceptional entries 'Mr Mac' and 'Muscatel Grapes'. The competition takes place every two years and is open to all artists either born or resident in Wiltshire. The Oexmann award was established by American millionaire

George Oexmann in memory of his wife, Theophila Joan Oexmann (nee Copland-Griffiths), who originally hailed from Potterne.

Mrs Oexmann was a noted artist and her early death prompted Mr Oexmann to establish the awards through the Wiltshire Archaeological and Natural History Society.



The Judges:

Mitch Griffiths has been a judge of the Oexmann Art Award Competition for several years. The BP Portrait Award winner has had several exhibitions at the Halcyon Gallery in London, including Reality (2006) which looked at brands and commercialism. He examines the contemporary world in an exceptionally realist style.

Joanna May is a well known local artist who has a gallery in Devizes.



THE BUZZ ABOUT BEES

ROYAL JELLY - SUPER FOOD?

Royal jelly is the perfect food..... for bees! It is a pearly white jelly secreted from two glands in the worker bees' heads, and fed to the young bee larvae. Packed with protein, essential fatty acids, vitamins and minerals it has everything a young bee needs. But nothing that isn't found in other foods more normally eaten by humans. Worker bee larvae are fed a little jelly for 3 days before switching to nectar and pollen. Queen bee larvae are fed lavishly on royal jelly. They are surrounded by it. When looking in a queen cell (where the new queens grow), the larva often can't be seen for the jelly. This rate of feeding allows an astonishing rate of growth; the larva growing around a thousand times bigger in 5 days (they are still a small creature though with 15 to 20 of them weighing the same as a new penny). In order to produce this jelly the young worker bees gorge themselves with pollen, the protein & fat source, and with nectar or diluted honey, the carbs in a bee's diet. The well fed bees store protein and fat in their bodies and this allows them to produce the royal jelly (sometimes called bee milk). Slightly bigger bees are bred at the end of summer, who can store more fat and protein inside themselves. These bees survive through winter and are able to feed the new bees in late winter and very early spring when there is little pollen and nectar around .

So why is royal jelly thought to be good for us? Is it all in the name? Maybe. Would we be so keen if the food of dung beetles was found to be highly nutritious? Perhaps not.

Royal jelly is claimed to help a wide range of conditions including: Aging (!) menopause, pms, obesity, dry eye, hay fever, infertility, high cholesterol, asthma, pancreatitis, kidney disease..... The list goes on. That's before we start on cosmetics. There is not good evidence for this. Trials have shown some improvements in some conditions but probably nothing a well balance diet wouldn't sort out.

Now we get to the real horror story. How it is collected. A strong colony has its queen removed and dozens of artificial queen cells are introduced into the hive. Each cell has a tiny worker larva placed into it (called grafting), and the bees instinctively treat these as queen cells and feed them generously with royal jelly. Three days later, the queen larvae are pulled out and discarded and the royal jelly in the cells is slurped up with a dropper. The process is repeated Each queen cell produces a few drops (around 1/3 of a gram) so around fifteen hundred queen bee larvae are culled in order to produce around a pound in weight, This is what a serious producer of royal jelly might expect from each hive used.

In my own hives now the bees are not thinking about making queens. They are still keeping warm, eating honey and starting to raise the new worker bees for the spring work ahead.



NEWS FROM ROWDE PRIMARY ACADEMY

Our bright start leads to their bright future



At Rowde C of E Primary Academy, we have really enjoyed our return to school after Christmas and New Year. We planned lots of great trips and experiences in January and, as always, are prioritising the children's lessons and areas of learning. As a team, we are constantly striving to improve and we're lucky enough to be part of the Acorn Education Trust where there's lots of opportunities for professional development and collaboration across schools. We work very closely with Wansdyke school in Devizes and working with their Headteacher, Mr Sam Heard, has certainly helped us to make continued improvements.

Earlier in the term, we had a Quality Assurance visit from an active Ofsted inspector. She is employed by the Trust to visit schools and monitor the quality of education and the school's plans and progress to improve. She spent time doing 'deep dives' into early reading (phonics) and maths. She was really positive about the consistency and quality of teaching she saw - very explicitly commenting on the improvements since her last visit which was summer 2021. She categorically said that the children at Rowde are not getting an inadequate education and she didn't see any negative behaviour throughout the course of the day. She said the children were polite and all engaged in their learning - something I'm always very proud of! Every child she spoke to confidently said that there was no bullying at Rowde and that they feel safe. As we continue to wait for the official Ofsted visit, this is a really positive experience to recognise how far we've come and identify some areas to continue to develop – good teachers and schools never stop learning and developing their own practice. I was told once that if I ever feel like I've cracked it, then that's the time to retire!

New Reception canopy

As well as working hard to improve in the building, our site and outdoor areas are on the up, too! The old wooden structure on the playground has been replaced to give our youngest pupils a bright, colourful and sheltered area for learning outside. Outdoor learning is crucial to good Early Years

Provision and this will make it a little more bearable in the extreme weather. We are really pleased with how it's brightened the area and we know that the children will get great use out of it for years to come.

Whole-school trip to Panto

Just before Christmas, we took the whole school to watch Beauty and the Beast at the Wyvern Theatre in Swindon. It was a brilliant show and quite magical to see how much the children enjoyed it. Looking around the theatre at the other school groups, I was really proud of how pupils from Rowde behaved and really made the most of the experience.

We are now back into the routine of having Fran Hall and a number of other volunteers from St Matthew's Church to visit the school bi-weekly to retell a Bible story. Every time children from a different class become the actors and support the narration. With very little practice, the group perform to the whole school. It is a highlight of our collective worship calendar and the children are always so keen to volunteer; we are very grateful to the volunteers for giving up their time.



As we move into Spring, we are looking forward to more trips – Year 5 are off to the Winchester Science Museum – and continuing to go up to Dauntseys for our swimming lessons and a range of other opportunities. Parish Council Meetings

Since the last edition of the Rowde Village News, the Parish Council met on 14th December 2022 and 11th January 2023.

New Parish Councillors!

Two new Parish Councillors have been co-opted onto Rowde Parish Council. We welcome back Chris Stevens, and a warm welcome Mark Somerville. Their contact details can be found under the Parish Council contacts.

Village Precept - no change to residents' charge

The Parish Council agreed to set the precept with a 0% increase for residents. Due to an increase in the tax base, the Parish Council will receive a higher value of precept at \pounds 39,371.54. Payment for a band D house remains at \pounds 78.47 per annum.

Farewell to Christmas

Thank you to Mandy Humphreys for arranging the Village Advent Window Calendar, which was greatly enjoyed by everyone. Thank you too to all Councillors who were involved in erecting and taking down the Village Christmas Tree. Thank you to the Village Hall for allowing the tree to be sited on their land.

Looking forward to... the Coronation!

Plans to celebrate the Coronation have begun. There will be a Village party on Saturday 6th May 2023 in the evening. Music has been booked for the event. Food and drink will also be provided. Highways

Flooding

Wiltshire Council is investigating the cause of the flooding on Devizes Road, Rowde.

Speeding

The Parish Council will purchase a Speed Indicator Device. Three locations have been agreed with Wiltshire Council. These are sites already approved for the Community Speed Watch Team, with the addition of a further site which has been agreed through a metro count. Further locations can be added at a later date.

Potholes

Wiltshire Council has diverted the Parish Stewards to filling the potholes on the road.

Residents are urged to report faults in the road or other Wiltshire Council issues through the My Wilts App. The App has recently been improved and updated. It is the most efficient way of reporting problems for members of the public and Council officers.

Silverwood School – transport

Rowde Parish Council had expressed concern

about the anticipated increase in the volume of traffic travelling to the newly expanded Silverwood School from September 2023 and more vehicles using Marsh Lane. The Passenger Transport department of Wiltshire Council predicts that the number of vehicles travelling to the school from the Marsh Lane direction from September 2023 will drop from 21 vehicles to 15. Higher capacity vehicles will be used to transport students.

It was originally intended for Larkrise School in Trowbridge and St Nicholas' School in Chippenham to close. It has been agreed now that children under 11 years of age will continue to attend both sites.

Planning

Planning Application: PL/2022/090890: Full Planning application, Rowdefield Farm, Rowde, SN10 2JE. Erection of open fronted shed to provide winter house/ cover for 25 sheep and goats. The Parish Council supports the application.

Planning Application: PL/2022/08360: Full Panning Application: The Firs, The Locks, Devizes, SN10 1QR. Demolition of existing dwelling and construction of replacement dwelling, complete with associated external works. The Parish Council had no objections. Planning Application: PL/2022/09222: Full Planning Application: Stroud Farm, Sandridge Farm, Brick Hill, Bromham, SN15 2JL. Change of use of existing agriculture store to a residential holiday let. The Parish Council did not agree on a response to the application. It that the property had been renovated originally without planning permission.

Neighbourhood Planning: update from meeting on 28th November 2022

It was agreed at the meeting that there would be no general call for sites. The most current version of the SHELAA (the Strategic Housing and Economic Land Availability Assessment) will be used for site selection. The next part of the process is for the land to be assessed for suitability to be included in the Devizes Area Neighbourhood Plan. This assessment will be carried out by AECOM, an external agent.

Consultation events are being planned for when the external assessments have taken place.

The Chairman remarked on the Government's intention to scrap planning targets. The Chairman noted caution as it could mean that development without any restrictions could exceed the original targets set.

A question was asked about the availability of the minutes from the last Neighbourhood Planning meeting and whether the Neighbourhood Plan website is operational again.

Furlong Close

The Chairman and other Parish Councillors attended the Open Day at Furlong Close on 12th December 2022. The event was hosted by Community First who are promoting the communal areas on behalf of the owners, SSH. They are looking for tenants to take on the administration block, workshops, and horticultural area with orchard, either separately or together.

Footpaths

A local resident is leading a footpath audit for the village to help improve accessibility. If you are out walking and spot a problem with a footpath, for example if signage is not clear or the pathway is overgrown, please can you report it to us. If you could take the "whats3words" code – it would be really helpful for us to find the exact location (link below to download the app).

https://what3words.com/products/what3words-app Also (if possible), please can you include a photo with the description of work needed? It would be very helpful when deciding what tools are needed before the group set out.



AID FOR UKRAINE

If you have been following the story about Rowde's link to Aid for Ukraine, here are some updates I have received since the last issue of the Rowde Village News:

10th - 17th January 2023

Valeriy is headed back to Ukraine on the same train that I have boarded at Chełm; his home or what is left of it is in Mykolaiv. He is 83 years old, was born in Russia but has lived most of his life in Ukraine and elsewhere. At the border crossing, the passport he hands over is Ukrainian. We are introduced when he steps in to help me with a slight translation problem (the problem being I can't speak Ukrainian). He is softly spoken; his eyes sparkle in the torch lit compartment. Close your eyes and you could be listening to someone in their 50s. He asks me in fluent French if I speak French. Then he speaks excellent English, his German sounds convincing and he also mentions Spanish. All in addition to Russian and Ukrainian.

He shares his food with me.

We share photographs of home, of family and travels. He has worked abroad extensively; he recalls his contribution to the design of ships. Melancholia casts a shadow across his face. 'My old friends are all gone' he says 'and I don't know what I'm going home to'. Mykolaiv has been extensively damaged by Russian bombing and Valeriy has been warned that his house has not escaped the shelling.

Sasha, who is two years old and who is sharing our compartment along with her mother and father, is on hand to break the spell. She has chatted without pause for two hours and provided us with a hilarious dance routine in the blacked out corridor with torches for stage lights. Like a puppy that senses sadness, she takes Valeriy's hand and pulls. He obliges by following her into the corridor and soon she is providing a running commentary on what is clearly a fascinating station platform; Valeriy patiently nods and agrees in all the right places. In the compartment, the young couple try to catch a few moments of rest from little Sasha's bundle of joyful energy but she has other plans. She skips in and turns her attention to me. She tugs at my hand, chattering persuasively. We play handover-hand; she squeals with delight; it seems that playing with the odd fellow who can't speak properly is highly amusing. Her joy is a jarring contrast to the sombre mood that hangs in every corridor and compartment. And I realise that I could be doing this until I arrive in Kovel. And then she looks up as though she has just remembered something important, climbs onto the seat next to her mother, lies down in the darkness of the blacked out compartment - and silence descends. When I step down into the darkness of the station platform in Kovel, a familiar voice greets me.



Vova and I are driving 1000km to Dnipro, the city on the famous river of the same name in the south east of the country. Some time ago, I met Artur (Bakhmut Fire and Rescue Service) when we delivered a load of aid to the city of Bakhmut. We have kept in touch since and I have committed to return with aid that he has requested. With the minibus repaired and armed with recent donations, I join Vova as he negotiates, charms and cajoles suppliers into providing items on the list and food for people trapped in the city. The plan is to drive to Dnipro which we think is relatively safe and then make the short(ish) journey to Bakhmut if we receive positive intelligence. When we arrive in Dnipro,



the plan changes; the previous evening Artur and the rescue team have been involved in pulling a civilian out of the wreckage of a building demolished by Russian shelling of Bakhmut. He is alive but his left leg is severely damaged. It is safer for us to leave the aid in Dnipro and Artur will collect it later. We're able to leave several hundred dollars of pre cooked and high energy foods for people in basements who cannot cook. We have also been able to provide equipment requested by the Bakhmut Fire and Rescue Service.

We head out of Dnipro for the return trip. We do not know it yet but Dnipro will be attacked later in the day and 40 civilians will be killed when an apartment block collapses.

24 hours later I am back in Poland with Anton and Valentina (his mother). We join the celebration of the Orthodox New Year with Ukrainian families at the refuge near to their home. Two of the families are from Dnipro. The hope that a new year should bring is tempered/ muted by images of horror on every phone screen around the table.

The Russian invasion of Ukraine has left many thousands of completely innocent people dead, injured, traumatised, bereaved, homeless, destitute. Valentina, my host, grew up in Kovel. She has just told me that there are funerals in Kovel today for two of the many soldiers who have been killed. Both left Kovel to fight for Ukraine on 25th February 2022, a day after the invasion began. Both were killed on the same day. They are Kutsik Mykhailo (aged 49) and Kutsik Oleksandr (26); they are father and son.

Do you not know that a man is not dead while his name is still spoken?

The road remained closed for two days as the council worked with the area's energy suppliers SSE. SSE did not report any power outages in Rowde as a result of the fall despite the tree landing on the electrical cables on the opposite side of the road.

CRIBBAGE AT THE GEORGE & DRAGON

Many of you might have a vague idea that cribbage might be a sort of game, but beyond that.....?

It is, in fact, a very old card game, coming up to its 400th anniversary, developed by an English poet in the 1630s from an earlier, and simpler, version. The first set of rules was published in 1662 and has remained unchanged. The game grew rapidly in popularity across the Englishspeaking world as British workers emigrated. Miners and mariners were major spreaders of the game, especially to the USA and Canada, where the game remains hugely popular. A mining town in Montana proclaims itself 'The Cribbage Capital of The World' and it is a fact that the current oldest submarine in the US Navy is always tasked with being the home of the cribbage set that belonged to a WWII submariner admiral!

And it's amazing how many cribbage terms have sneaked their way into the language that people use every day. 'Level-pegging' and 'pegging-out' are just two of them. And quirky little expressions are still used in play – such as 'Morgan's orchard' for two pairs, 'one for his knob' and 'two for his heels' for Jacks, and '5's a fix' for making up a score from 26 to 31, 'and 9 will do' for 22 to 31 (which is the final score for a game). Many rhyming expressions like this have been handed down over the centuries and form an accompanying patter to what is otherwise quite a quiet game.

Cribbage does not belong to any of the usual families of card games though it features many of the usual ways of scoring points such as runs, flushes and multiples which are familiar if you've any played other card game. It can be played by 2, 3 or 4 people. It is a point scoring game, using pegs on a wooden board to keep a tally, that has few rules, so learning the basic game is relatively simple – but you soon get to realise that playing it really well brings in a lot of strategy, tactics and mental calculation of odds.

But the game is fun. And it remains the only card game that it is legal to play in licensed premises in the UK without specific permission from the Local Authority. Many areas have leagues – in which, of course, matches are held in pubs and clubs.

The Devizes area has its own league, and has had for many, many years. And Rowde has always had its team based at the George & Dragon. Matches are competitively played, but always in the friendliest way.



During lock-down, the team captain of the last 30 years, Pete Preston, sadly 'pegged out' and we realised that we would need to recruit additional people if the team was to continue. So we posted a few words on 'Rowde All About It' and were delighted by the response, both from experienced players who wanted to get back into the game and people who just fancied learning it. We decided that we would meet on Monday evenings – a relatively quiet night at the pub as Chippy was the first recruit (now a team member!) - and that we would start early (1830) so that we would be able to get out of his way if there was a sudden rush for tables in the restaurant. We play a couple of games before enjoying a few sandwiches, for which we make a very small contribution.

And there are now up to 16 of us – and the numbers keep growing. We are now hoping that in the next Cribbage League season, starting in October, we will be able to raise at least one additional team of four (plus a couple of reserves) who want to make the commitment to play Thursday evening matches through to March.

Our little Monday evening group always welcomes newcomers who would like to play or learn this wonderful old game, so if you fancy giving it a go, give Kath a call on 07746 038929, so we can give Chippy an idea of numbers for refreshments, or just turn up at the George & Dragon by 6.30pm. We look forward to seeing you.

SILVERWOOD SCHOOL, ROWDE SET FOR REFURBISHMENT AFTER FUNDING BOOST



The co-educational special school, which has campuses in Rowde, Chippenham and Trowbridge, is one of 239 schools chosen by the Department for Education for the School Rebuilding Programme.

The programme was set up to identify and either replace or refurbish school buildings across England to create "modern educational environments."

The refurbishment will take place alongside the £38 million campus extension, which will provide provision for 350 pupils by Autumn 2023.

Cllr Laura Mayes, Wiltshire Council's cabinet member for education, said: "This is excellent and very welcome news. It will allow us to fulfil our commitment to ensuring that all young people in Wiltshire get the best start in life.

"Earlier this year we submitted a bid for the complete refurbishment of the Grade II listed school building on the Silverwood Rowde site. The building needs complete refurbishment, over all three floors both structurally and internally. The schools announced as part of the programme will be reviewed and prioritised according to condition need and other relevant criteria. The Department for Education will start working with the highest priority schools between April 2023 and January 2024, with a view to completing those projects soon after."

The refurbished building will provide classrooms, offices and an enterprise zone.

POWER OUTAGES PLUNGE PEOPLE INTO DARKNESS



Almost 100 people between Rowde and Bromham were left without power throughout much of Friday, December 2

Scottish and Southern Electricity Networks confirmed that an unplanned outage had been reported at 12.08pm.

The loss of power affected 88 households. On their website, Scottish and Southern Electricity Networks said: "We're sorry for the loss of supply. We currently have a fault affecting the areas listed."

TEENAGER FROM SILVERWOOD SCHOOL RAISES ALMOST £2,000 FOR CHARITY

14 years old Thomas Pratchett has raised almost £2,000 for charity by cycling 67 miles. He was inspired to raise money for Children in Need after seeing the Rickshaw Challenge come through Marlborough.



Thomas' mum, Louise Bradwell was incredibly proud of his achievements and felt the whole community had got behind the challenge.

She said: "I'm absolutely over the moon with him. He's infectious, he's so bright and bubbly and he has thoroughly enjoyed the whole experience. People have been stopping to talk to us and he's had people waving and beeping at him when he's riding down to the high street so I'm just over the moon. Thomas has always loved watching Children in Need on the telly so we were thinking what we could do to get him raising some money. He loves his tricycle so we thought we would set him his own little challenge".

Thomas comfortably surpassed his target of cycling 60 miles to raise £500 by clocking up 67 miles, in and around Marlborough, and raising £1871 in just three weeks. On average, Thomas rode three miles everyday after school and five miles on weekends.

MANHOLE MISERY FOR MOTORISTS

Motorists travelling on the A361 to Devizes faced delays recently after a drain cover collapsed overnight. The closure affected the eastbound carriageway at Caen Hill just after the turning for Rowde.



Cllr Iain Wallis said: "Wiltshire Council were informed by police that a manhole/drain cover in the carriageway had collapsed so a lane was closed."

Work was done over two days to repair the cover and whilst it was closed, the drains were also cleared.

Editor's Footnote: My daughter was one of several people who's vehicles suffered costly wheel and tyre damage by hitting the manhole cover before the police could get to the scene!



Defending Residential Choices for People with Learning Disabilities and/or Autism

A fundamental Human Right is not being met for people with learning disabilities and/or autism.

The European Court of Human Rights, Article 2:1 states: "Everyone [...] Shall have the right to liberty of movement and freedom to CHOOSE [their] residence". The Care Quality Commission's (CQC) guidelines state the provision of CHOICE lies at the heart of all policy making: "the underpinning principles of choice [...] are fundamental to what a good service looks like for every person" (*Registering the Right Support*, 2017). Yet, the full spectrum of **CHOICE** of residence is not currently being given to people with learning disabilities and/or autism, and their families.

CHOICE is denied.

Just as there is complete freedom of choice in the general population of where we live, people with learning disabilities and/or autism should have the right to choose where they live. This may be in the heart of a vibrant city, in quieter suburbs, or in a smaller town, village, or group community. This full spectrum of **CHOICE** of residence should be at the centre of guidelines that regulate any service that currently, or intends to, provide regulated care to people with autism and people with a learning disability.

However, the CQC in its statutory guidance explicitly denies a **CHOICE** of living in new group or village communities and places unachievable requirements on existing communities. For example, the CQC asserts that it will not register or favourably rate new campus or congregate settings (*Right Support, Right Care, Right Culture,* 2020). This narrative has been used by CQC inspectors and external care providers to justify the closure of group and village communities, equating them to 'campuses', regardless of the quality of care provided.

Since 2006, we believe at least 40 such residential care communities have been forced to close and in 2020 the CQC made closures easier by asserting it will not support 'campus' models of care. Closures have uprooted people with learning disabilities and/or autism from their homes, against their wishes, and moved them into new, often isolated, and unfamiliar locations. Although the CQC claims **CHOICE** is at the forefront of policy and care, their current guidelines are enabling **CHOICE** of residence to be denied.

What needs to be done:

The '**Our Life Our CHOICE'** campaign seeks an update to CQC and other guidance to make it clear to care providers, local authority commissioning teams and those involved in provision of care for people with learning disabilities and/or autism that well managed and regulated group and village communities should be considered equally alongside small urban and rural residential living, supported living, and independent living. Guidelines should not impose bias against such communities based on geographical location or size of the community. Guidelines and policy should recognise that for some individuals, these communities offer people's CHOSEN quality of life.

People with learning disabilities and/or autism should not face the discrimination created by the denial of a CHOICE of residence which is open to all other members of society.



YOUR PCC PHILIP WILKINSON

Listening to recent results of how Wiltshire Police officers feel about their job, their morale and general state of mind causes me great concern.

Hearing people's lived experiences are often very, very, different to what you think you know. I talk to our frontline officers regularly and these results aren't surprising given the last six months Wiltshire Police has had - and how policing is regarded generally at the moment.

But we can't just look at one element of these survey results in insolation.

Everything I, and my office, have been working on in the last few months - getting the right person for our next Chief Constable, the police precept and ensuring we have a budget that balances investment with efficiency, increasing performance, looking at strategic leadership and culture issues - is inter-connected with improving morale.

I heard an interesting quote this week: 'Culture eats strategy for breakfast'. And it's so true!

We can have all the strategies, plans, documents we like but if our workplace isn't in a good place, our standards and culture is off balance then we must acknowledge it will have direct impact on those working for the organisation.

Why does this matter? Why aren't we just getting on with policing?

Well, if we have more happy, satisfied, officers out on our streets - if they are staying in their jobs longer than a few years - then this ultimately has a knock-on effect on our communities, on the police service being delivered and it will contribute to Making Wiltshire Safer - the primary goal of both Wiltshire Police and my office.



Someone said this week that policing had been trading on the goodwill of its officers and staff for guite a long time - it is now time to redress that imbalance.

One good area to start would be to tackle pay - I believe police officers deserve to earn a decent salary - and Witshire Police deserves to have a fairer slice of the central government pie.

And that's why I will be adding my voice, along with other PCCs, on both of these issues at a national conference in a few weeks' time.

We all know lobbying for change takes time and that is why, in the meantime, I will be focusing on this - and how to tackle the root causes of these worrying results - over the coming months with our current leadership and our incoming new Chief Constable.

It has been a busy start to 2023 for us all.

I am writing this in January when it is still freezing cold but am hoping that when this is published things will have warmed up and we can be hopeful of some warmer weather and spring flowers to cheer us up!

I regularly attend Rowde Parish Council meetings to update members on Wiltshire Council news, and to hear local issues. Parish Councillors were concerned the expansion of Silverwood School would result in extra vehicles using Marsh Lane. I worked with Wiltshire Council officers to model the expected journeys once the school expands in September this year. Under the current transport arrangements there are currently 21 vehicles using Marsh Lane (roughly a third of our transport into the school). The good news is that by procuring higher capacity vehicles, and with primary pupils staying at the Trowbridge campus, this number will fall to 15 vehicles. I am grateful for the challenge from Councillors to investigate this issue.






