THE BUZZ ABOUT BEES

A bit about ivy, more about bumblebees

As we teeter on the edge of autumn, the ivy is coming into flower. I know many gardeners, myself included, see ivy as a bit of a nuisance. However spare a moment to watch a patch of flowering ivy on a sunny warm afternoon and see the diversity of insects feeding there. It will be positively alive with flying wildlife. This is the last big forage crop for bees of many types, flies, hoverflies, wasps, butterflies and the occasional homet. So if you can, spare a patch or two for the wildlife. This plant alone gets many insects through the winter and the berries that follow sustain many species of birds.

Last time I wrote about solitary bees. This time I would like to cover bumblebees. These are the bees beloved by cartoonists – big, fluffy and stripy. They are the most obvious bees in the garden, with their big fur coats allowing them to fly earlier in the day and later at night when it would be too cool for honeybees.

There are over 20 species of bumblebee in the UK – some common and familiar and some vanishingly rare . The rarest bumble bee in Britain is the great yellow bumblebee found only in the northernmost parts of Scotland, but common types you might see in your garden are buff-tailed bumblebee (and the white tailed and red tailed), the garden bumblebee, the early bumblebee and the common carder bee.

Increasingly common is the tree bumblebee. Unusually these nest higher up (hence the name) and a favourite location is a bird box. Relatively new to the UK these bees were first seen here in 1992,

Most bumblebees live in small colonies in nests in the ground, perhaps an old mouse hole (some queen bumblebees are attracted by the smell of mouse urine!), between the bales in haystacks, but even a tussock of grass will do. The colonies numbers a few hundred at most and do not survive winter. In the spring, the mated queen emerges from her solitary hibernation. She starts the colony and raises the first few bumblebees by herself. When she has enough workers (child labour is alive and well in the world of bees), she will stay in the nest, lay more eggs and never emerge again. The worker bumblebees tend to be quite a bit smaller that the queen. This is why we see big queen bumblebees early in the year, then they disappear only to reappear at the end of summer and early autumn. The reappearance is due to the last generation of bumblebees the colony raises which are drones and virgin queens. The drones fly out of the nest and hang around outside other bumblebee nest and wait for the virgins to emerge! Mating occurs and the young queens fly off to fatten up ready to hibernate and repeat the process next year. The nests are not reused so if you get a bumblebee nest in your garden, try and leave it alone and it will be gone by the end of summer. In answer to a common question, bumble bees do make honey but it is only stored in very small amounts and used to keep the colony going on rainy days.

For the quizzers and Harry Potter fans amongst you, Dumbledore is an old English word for bumblebee!

'Songbirds' by Christy Lefteri

Nisha has crossed oceans to give her child a future. Now she spends her days caring for someone else's daughter while her own awaits her return half a world away. Nisha is employed by Petra as a housekeeper, their lives have nothing in common other than the love they have for their daughters.

When Nisha disappears no one else apart from Petra and Nisha's secret lover cares about the disappearance of Nisha, a foreign domestic worker. Whilst searching for Nisha her friends realise how little they really knew about he and her life.

When writing this book the author was inspired by true stories of love and loss, hope and refuge and the enduring love of a mother for her child.

The Songbirds was the least popular of the two selected titles and the opinions of those who did read it varied. It was acknowledged that it was a well written, thought provoking novel but some thought it was at times too graphic.


'House of Fortune' by Jessie Burton


This is the sequel to The Miniaturist which was broadcast on terrestrial TV and this perhaps accounted for it being a more popular choice to read.



Our bright start leads to their bright future

At Rowde C of E Primary Academy, we have had a brilliant start to the new school year, in spite of challenges in the media. Our first week was like no other – lots of negative news about the cost of living, a new Prime Minister and, of course, the loss of Queen Elizabeth II. We have paid our respects and celebrated our late Queen through collective worship and a commemorative space on our prayer tree. However, luckily, the school remains a safe haven for our pupils.

I'd like to take this opportunity to welcome our new families and children who have come into our Reception class – we are so proud of how quickly they have settled, going to full days and starting their learning with optimism and determination. We are also lucky to have a number of new teachers with us for teaching in Computing, PE and Art/DT. Our children are now engaged in more creative play, collaborating together across year groups, and we have significantly fewer peer disputes and first aid issues.

After the Parish Council meeting in July, the Parish Council was made aware of a proposal to build on land off Sands Lane, Rowde.

The current proposal is to build up to 70 houses on this land.

The developers held a consultation meeting for local residents to view their proposal on Tuesday 6th September. The Parish Council hosted a village meeting on Wednesday 7th September for residents to discuss the proposal.

No planning application has been submitted at this time.

ROYAL FUN COLUMN

Welcome to this month's fun column where we are featuring Queen Elizabeth II anecdotes.

The younger generation of royals are known for their jokes - especially Prince Harry - but it turns out that Queen Elizabeth II was truly top dog when it came to quick-witted retorts. A common criticism of the monarchy is that the senior royals are too serious, so it's nice to know that the queen had a penchant for laughter.

As Prince Harry once revealed of his relatives, "They are very funny together. My family is the same as any other family when it comes to humor behind closed doors." So if you think of Her Majesty as prim and proper, be prepared to witness a totally different side of the queen in these heartwarming anecdotes.

Queen Elizabeth's former protection officer, Richard Griffin, recounted an amusing incident involving a group of American tourists while she was walking near Balmoral, her estate in Scotland. At the time, the queen was wearing a tweed coat and a head scarf when a group approached her, asking, "Have you ever met the Queen?" Her response was, "No," before pointing at Griffin, saying, "But he has."

Artist Juliet Pannett recalled another hilarious case of misidentification. When she was painting a portrait of Queen Elizabeth, the monarch told her about a funny run-in she had while out buying groceries. "In one of her stories, she told us she had been at Sandringham one day," Pannett said. "They were having tea when they ran out of cake. So, the queen said she had gone down to the local shop to buy some, wearing a head scarf. As she came out of the shop, an elderly lady said, 'Good heavens, you look just like the queen.' She replied 'How reassuring' and just kept walking. It was a wonderful tale."

For almost as long as she was ruler, Queen Elizabeth attended the Royal Variety Performance and in 1960, one of the musical guests was the Everly Brothers. The sibling duo performed their hit song "Cathy's Clown," but the queen was apparently not a fan. She reportedly leaned over to her lady-in-waiting and remarked, "They sound like two cats being strangled!"

In her book The Wicked Wit, author Karen Dolby reveals the queen wasn't blown away by Niagara Falls when she visited Canada. "It looks very... damp," the queen commented.

The queen was very rarely spotted without her purse (she needed it to send secret signals to her staff, after all!), and one time a guest decided to remark on it. When Roger Moore — aka James Bond — and his then-wife Luisa Mattioli were with the queen, Mattioli asked Her Majesty why she needed to carry her purse around Buckingham Palace. The queen wryly replied, "This house is very big, you know."

Of course, "big" is quite an understatement. At 860,000 square feet, Buckingham Palace contains 775 rooms across its five floors. Inside there's a doctor's office, a post office, and even a movie theater. Outside, Buckingham Palace is home to the largest garden in London. The lush 40 acres can fit 8,000 people comfortably. Wow!



MORE NEEDS TO BE DONE TO ADDRESS CRASHES!

Councillor Iain Wallis said: "Having grown up in Devizes I am aware of many accidents along the A361 particularly at Caen Hill and the Bishops Cannings crossroads, some of which have been fatal.



A driver in his 50s from Swindon nearly caused a head-on crash after an 11-car overtake and was issued a ticket in relation to the incident on August 10th.

"Wiltshire Council has put £300,000 into this year's highways budget to investigate a redesign of Caen Hill to make this road safer but it is likely that more work is also needed at the other end of Devizes as well as resurfacing.

FURLONG CLOSE UPDATE!

As your readers will I hope be aware, Furlong Close has been saved! After a long and hardfought campaign, with the support of the local community, the future of the site is now assured.

We have thus moved from the nightmare of October 2020, when the site was slated for immediate closure, with its vulnerable residents to suffer the indignity and trauma of being forcibly relocated from their long-term home, to the dream of these special people now being able to remain amongst their friends and familiar carers, in the surroundings which have been their home for many years.

This remarkable victory was marked on Saturday, 17 September by a celebration held at Furlong Close, to thank the many supporters from the local community who contributed to it. The sun shone as 150 guests watched the residents 'cut the ribbon' to acknowledge the acquisition of the site by its new owner, Specialised Supported Housing and the taking over of care by a new care provider, Agincare Enable.

In summing up that wonderful occasion, I can do no better than quote the words of Danny Kruger MP, who proposed a toast in which he said:

"Saving Furlong Close from closure has been a true community effort. The families and friends of the people who live there, the village of Rowde and the wider Devizes area have worked so hard to find a way to allow those



who wanted the choice to stay in their homes to do so. I have been quite overwhelmed with the turnout today and the show of love and support for this special place."

THE QUEEN'S VISIT TO ROWDE!

The Queen visited the Caen Hill locks on August 8th 1990 for the opening of the Kennet & Avon Canal. It has been reported that whilst the Queen and her party were visiting the Caen Hill locks and upon being told that they were in Devizes, she pointed out to her hosts that the majority of the locks were in fact in Rowde!



The Queen's last visit to Wiltshire occurred on October 15th 2020, when the Queen formally opened the Energetics Analysis Centre in Porton Down at the Defence Science and Technology Laboratory. The Queen, accompanied by Prince William witnessed a display of a Forensic Explosives Investigation, met Counter Terrorism and Security staff and military individuals involved in the Novichok incident.

LONDON TRIP TO PAY RESPECTS

On Saturday 17 September I went and paid my last respects to our late Queen in Westminster Hall. James and I had the honour of meeting her several times while he was commanding the Household Cavalry Mounted Regiment at Hyde Park Barracks in London, a job he did for three years between 2015 and 2018. He came into contact with Her Late Majesty quite regularly, but we had a few memorable encounters with her as a couple.



I thought I would share this photograph which was taken 2017 when she came with the then Prince of Wales to visit the barracks and officially name the regiment's newest drum horse, Perseus, pictured with the Queen and James. Her smile says it all! They were with us for about half a hour, had a quick tour around the stables, met soldiers and some of their families and sat for a formal photograph with the regiment.



James has now left the army but is a member of the Sovereign's Bodyguard, the Honourable Corps of Gentleman at Arms. He stood vigil at the Queen's lying in state and, having been unable to queue due to work and family commitments, and thanks to him and his role there, I was able to gain entry to the hall through "the side door". Yes, I did feel like a complete fraud, but I wasn't going to turn down the offer and the opportunity to say farewell. The atmosphere was extraordinary - you could have heard a pin drop. Standing in front of the coffin in contemplation, I could have been the only person in the room, despite the flow of people passing through. HRH QUEEN ELIZABETH - NOTES FROM THE PAST

I joined the Army in Autumn 1977 as an Apprentice Soldier in Deepcut Surrey. Brookwood train station was full of young men full of trepidation which for most of us was the first time we had been away from home.

Hundreds and hundreds of us arrived at the RAOC Apprentice college who, once off the coaches, were placed into platoon size squads of 40 with the accompaniment of the platoon sergeants screaming and shouting just for good measure.

If my memory serves me correctly, one lad simply stepped forward and said I want to go home! He was duly sent away, put in a taxi with a train warrant to back from where he came.

The rest of us were marched off to our accommodation, shown our bed space then ordered to be outside within 10 minutes to collect our bedding from the bedding store, five itchy blankets, two sheets, two pillows and pillow cases and one bed spread. Back to the block, told be outside in five minutes to collect a track suit.

Once collected, marched to the cook house, fed then marched back to block. 30 mins later, off to get hair cut, once done marched back to the block to make our beds and unpack.....and the rest they say is history.

Fast forward nine months and HRH visited BOD Bicester, the huge MOD storage depot in the midlands. It is absolutely massive. Whole of the depot was ordered to provide guards of honour to line the route, something similar to what we witnessed this week in Whitehall.

We drilled and drilled for weeks, polishing our boots and ironed our kit until the day we drew our weapons boarded the busses and whisked away to Bicester before dawn. Upon arrival off the bus! Form up and wait.....and wait....and wait. Oh wait a minute she's on her way, whooshed past, that was it!

Now the Army being what it is, we were formed up and told to get on our heels because we are going to form up again ready for the Queen to whooosh past again. By the time we arrived we were soaked in sweat and our kit was in a crap state having just ran / force marched. HRH duly whooshed past none the wiser. Prob thinking my, we do have lots of soldiers just standing about in best uniform.

At this point we thought we were done......nope, get on you feffin heals again we are running to another location to form up again for HRH to whooosh past once more. Well you could imagine after three sessions of this we were knackered and it must have showed, as we were then ordered to march to the Naafi to be given refreshment (we loved it as we were all underage, and the Queen had ordered that we were to be given a pint). HRH knew all along what had been going on, she noted certain faces had kept mysteriously appearing further along the tour route and insisted that all the soldiers be given a refreshment, no small task as we were about 200 soldiers.

Finally, it was with a huge lump in my throat and heavy heart bursting with pride, that I watched the final service of our late Queens funeral on the big screen in Devizes Market Square.



I could never be more proud of our Armed Forces and indeed everyone who have worked tirelessly over the last 10 days to produce the ultimate mark of respect to our beloved Queen. May she rest in peace. Long live King Charles III.

YOUR PCC PHILIP WILKINSON

I've now been 'in the job' of PCC for a year, and if there is one thing that's been made abundantly clear to me, it's that your confidence in policing is not where I want it to be.

Whilst there are clearly some exceptional individual officers, overall, there have been gaps in the service you receive. In the past year, I have made practical steps to address them, such as the purchasing of effective technology such as drones and ensuring more officers are deployed to the rural crime team.

The damage done by crimes such as hare coursing, criminal damage and theft have a massive impact on the rural community and history shows that at times of recession, farms become targets.

I regularly speak to farmers and I'm all too aware of the reasons why you feel that reporting crime is not worthwhile. In my Police and Crime Plan, I've committed to ensure Wiltshire Police takes these crimes seriously and deals with them effectively.

This is why I've taken steps to ensure the rural crime team has the capabilities and staffing it needs.

As part of this commitment, Wiltshire Police has introduced online crime reporting specifically for rural crime. The form takes about ten minutes and is picked up by the same people who answer 101 calls.




It's vital that to build up an overall picture and identify patterns of criminal activity, all crime is reported, no matter how small it may seem.

As this has only recently been introduced, I welcome your feedback about how the system is working. It's only through working together that we can stop these crimes from happening and make Wiltshire a safer place to live and work.
